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PREFACE

Pachhunga University College is the Constituent College of Mizoram University. The college caters Undergraduate degree course in Arts, Science and Commerce. The college was established on 15th August 1958 as 'Aijal College' to become the first institution of higher education in Mizoram. It was founded and managed by a group of Mizo elders among which Mr. Pachhunga, a leading entrepreneur of the day, was the major benefactor, and after his demise the college was renamed Pachhunga Memorial College.

The college was provincialized by the Assam Government in 1965 and the college became Pachhunga Memorial Government College (PMG). On April 19, 1979 the North Eastern Hill University (NEHU) adopted and upgraded it as its only constituent college to become a pace-setting institution. The college eventually received its fourth name Pachhunga University College (PUC). With the establishment of Mizoram University, the entire management was handed over to the new university on July, 2001. The college caters undergraduate courses in 21 subject areas of Arts, Science and Commerce streams. The academic programme include, apart from effective class room teaching, internal semester test for semester system students (introduced in 2011-12 academic session) two terminal exams, periodic class tests, seminars, assignments, remedial courses, field studies etc. The college also promotes students exposure through study tours and excursion inside and outside the State. The college is a student centric centre. Students' welfare is the number one priority inside the college. The college is also the leader among all college in terms of research activities and publications. The college is also selected under "Star college scheme" by the Department of Biotechnology in 2012.

This Self Study Report being submitted for the second cycle of Assessment and Accreditation presents information as per the requirement laid down by NAAC in this regard. The report has been organized in two parts. The first part includes a Profile of the College and Executive Summary. The second part consists of the Criterion-wise Report and Department-wise Evaluative Report.

EXCUTIVE SUMMARY

CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

The motto of the college "Learning and Service" is reflected upon in the vision and mission. Right from its inception in 1958 the college strives to serve community through academic excellence and societal services.

The college is the only college in Mizoram offering three streams of graduate studies - Arts, Science and Commerce. The college offers 11 Arts subjects, 9 Science and a Commerce subject. This vast array of disciplines and subjects combinations provides to students a broad choice of courses, according to their interest. With a focus on student centric development of the students, excellence in both curricular as well as the extra-curricular activities is promoted.

Since the college is the only constituent college of Mizoram University, faculties of the college play an important role in the development of curricula of the University. Faculties of the college act as members of the School board, Board of Studies. The college have 28 faculties serving as member of School board, 42 faculties served as member BOS during the assessment period. 47 faculties are also involved in framing the CBCS system in the University. The college also has representatives in the Academic Council and Executive Council of the University.

The college has a good infrastructural and procedural support for effective curricular transaction. Technological innovations and innovations in traditional methods are used for holistic and student centric development. Practical based, field based, study tours, special talks, on the spot lecture system etc are also used for effective curricular transactions.

The college also conducts Certificate Courses, Diploma Courses and other add-on courses for students. The college has one self financed course in degree level - B. Sc in Biotechnology.

The college holds international, national, state and college level seminars/workshop and symposia in cross cutting issues like suicide prevention, biodiversity conservation, environmental awareness, human rights, education policy, etc. In an attempt towards creating awareness the college has a Women's Cell, Legal Cell, IT and Website committee, Eco club, Red Ribbon Club, Cultural Club, etc. which are meant to broaden an individual's mental horizons.

The college also has a good feedback system from various sections of stakeholders including students, parents, faculty, alumni and subject experts. Principal, Vice Principal, Academic committee and IQAC plays an important role in monitoring curricula transactions.

CRITERION II: TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

The college provides quality education in twenty one subjects. The college has a good, fair and transparent system of selection of candidates. Selections of candidates are done through merit system. The college admission rules and regulations are clearly interpreted in the college prospectus. Reservations of seats for the underprivileged and special section of the society are clearly defined.

The college is one of the most sought after educational institution for new admission. During the years 2011-15, 14,968 candidates applied for admission and 4,328 candidates were admitted, which in 28.91 %.

The college conducts remedial class to bridge the knowledge gap of students and to provide opportunities for slow learners. The principal organize a brief counseling session for newly admitted students. Departmental briefing and sensitization programmes are also organized at the start of each semester. Students are sensitized in college protocols, curricular aspect, examination system, value based- gender sensitization, anti-ragging, etc.

To incentivize students, the college has large number of prizes for outstanding academic performances as well as for excelling in the fields of Sports, NCC, NSS, and extra-curricular activities.

The College follows a multi-faceted learning process which includes not only the lecture and tutorial classes, but also interactive discussions, counseling, project works, and presentations. For better dissemination of knowledge, the college provides various communication tools like LCD projectors and laptops to the teachers and students. Industrial, historical, cultural and, religious tours are frequently organized for students to gain on site knowledge. Further, departments regularly organize seminars, extension-lectures, quizzes, debates and other activities in their respective fields. The college also has an active Students Union and various clubs etc. Students also have the option to join highly active NCC and NSS units, RRC, Adventure club, Literature club, Chess club etc. All these not only enhance academic value of the students but also contribute significantly to their overall personality development and skills.

The college has a well structured examination committee and academic committee which oversee the evaluation process. IQAC plays an important role in improving teaching and learning system. The college have various scheme and system to make student centric learning.

The college being a contituent college of Central University (MZU) strictly adheres to the UGC regulation for recruitment of faculties. The college has a good percentage of faculties with Doctorate degree. Faculties are encouraged to pursue further studies. The Faculty regularly participates in conferences, workshops, seminars, and refresher courses with many of them being regularly invited as resource persons at such events. The College also regularly organizes conferences, workshops and Seminars. Further, our faculty members are also associated with the University and UGC sponsored prestigious Innovation/ Research Projects.

The performance of the students and learning outcome is regularly evaluated and monitored by conducting periodic class tests, presentations, assignments, counseling. IQAC conducts annual review meeting and university result analysis. Each department prepares their own annual report which is submitted to IQAC. The report includes course-wise details on students' performances vis-a-vis peer colleges that reflect excellent performances of our students.

CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

The College dedicates its efforts towards achieving excellence in teaching and research to fulfill the vision of the college. Faculty members take keen interest in undertaking major and minor research projects from various funding and sponsoring agencies engaged in the field of higher education and research. There are 36 research projects amounting to Rs. 283 lakhs, which in the previous assessment was around 28 lakhs. The college is the only college in Mizoram having a dedicated research and instrumentation centre and Zoological Museum. The college organizes International, National and State level seminars to provide exposure to faculties and students.

The college has a research and project committee formulating research activities of the college. The committee also organizes research mentoring and monitoring workshop amongst faculties to promote research. The college also has adequate facilities to conduct practical and research. The college also host DBT institutional biotechnology hub to promote research in modern biology.

The research and other academic activities of the faculty and the students are not limited to the University Curriculum only but transcends beyond. The college is the only college under DBT STAR college for promoting research and scientific temper amongst students. The institution has an effective mechanism to disseminate research findings by sensitizing students through their involvement in various activity based programmes, engaging social media, and holding interactive programmes. At the level of undergraduate students STAR college scheme and Curricula provides research support and opportunity through Innovative Projects. Students presentation of assignment and projects are also done to promote ICT based learning. Institutional biotechnology hub provides training to faculties, staff and students in Modern biotechnology. The hub also conducts exposure programme for college, senior secondary and high school students and faculties of other institutions. The college also

host two DST women Scientist who are the only women scientist working within the state of Mizoram.

The college has good collaboration with International, National and local institutes in research activities. The college also has internal funding mechanism to promote research amongst faculties. The college faculties have a good research publications in National and international journals. Students also publish papers based on their projects. The college also plans to publish a multidisciplinary journal. The faculties of the college also served as consultants in many fields like Infrastructure development at Stress management, Student Database of colleges, Establishment of Laboratory etc.

The college conducts regular extension activities and social services so that, education and society benefits from such activities, and to impart a sense of good citizenship to students. The college is also the first educational institute in Mizoram to incorporate the policy of Village Adoption.

The college NSS, NCC, EU, RRC and departments engage the students and faculty at regular interval towards co-curricular activities such as voluntary blood donation, environmental cleanup, career counseling, personality development, quiz and debate competitions, paper presentation, Goodwill services etc

CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

The college has one of the best infrastructure facilities amongst all college in Mizoram. The college also has enough campus area for creation of new infrastructure. Infrastructural policy of the college is driven by visualization of future requirements of teachers, administrative staff and students. The campus consists of several buildings for Administration, Boys Hostels, Girls Hostels, Academic Blocks for Arts, Commerce, Life Science, Physical Science, an Auditorium, a General Science Block, a library and several quarters for faculty and non-teaching staff. The campus also houses Laboratories, Seminar Halls, Zoological museum, Conference Hall, canteens, and rooms allocated specially for IRC, NSS, NCC, Health Clinic, Examination Cell, IQAC, Placement Cell, Students Union, students recreation hall and Evangelical Union. Infrastructure for sports such as a football ground, a volleyball court, a basketball court, gymnasium and a multipurpose sports complex are available within the campus.

The Management of the College and the building committee ensures the infrastructure meets the requirements of the college. The newly constructed buildings includes a Library building, a Physical Science Block, two new Arts Blocks, Research and Instrumentation Centre, Hostel buildings for boys and girls. The construction of a multipurpose sports complex is still ongoing. The college also added a Language Lab, Computer Lab, Biotech Hub, GIS Lab in both Geology and Geography departments and an Internet Resource Centre. CCTV is installed in college buildings and campus. All new buildings of the college are constructed to meet the requirements of differently

abled students. The college also has health clinic facilities, students' recreation centers and other students' body centers.

Library provides books, journals, technical assistance and other learning resources which enable students to acquire information and knowledge required for their study. The college library is fully automated with SOUL 2.0 software. The college also has a provision of departmental library/book repositories in every department of ready references.

The college has a high speed 100 mbps internet facilities. Internet facility is available throughout the college campus. The college has free Wi-Fi, wired internet in each department and six Free Wi-Fi hotspot for students.

IT infrastructure and associated facilities, the college has adopted two strategies. First, the college provides training to the teachers in computer based teaching learning methods such as how to prepare power point presentations etc. Second, the college is introducing short term computer courses to those students who do not have any previous exposure to basic skills in computers.

The college have both boys and girls hostel which attracts and enabled rural communities for higher education at a cheaper rate. New boys' hostel is also under construction.

CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

The college is a student centric educational institute and all aspect of the focus is on the core values of contributing to development and fostering good educational values amongst students. The college prospectus is well developed and structured to meet the requirements of the students and other stakeholders.

The college has a well established student scholarship schemes. Various government and non government sponsored scholarship schemes are available. Apart from these private sponsored scholarship schemes are also available for meritorious students. Students' proficiency awards are also available for top rank holders in Science and Arts. Departmental awards system is also available in many departments. The institute has a student welfare scheme and Earn while Learn schemes.

The college provides special support to slow learners and those who need additional help through a variety of means such as remedial and extra classes. The Grievance Redressal Committee, Anti-Ragging Committee and Women cell, legal clinic ensure a conducive and secure environment for growth and development of students.

Since the college is located in a remote state within India, students' exposure is one of the priority areas. The college ensures exposure of its students to faculty and institutions of the highest standards in eminent Indian universities through workshops, seminars, talks and lectures etc. The college also organizes study tours, field visit, etc to

National Institutes, historical places, etc. Students' publications are encouraged. Apart from the annual magazine students newsletters and departmental newsletters are also published.

The college maintains regular contact with alumni and former faculty through email and social networking sites. The college has a functional Grievance Redressal cell. Students' progression to PG is good.

The college has varied range of sports facilities and a gymnasium which can be accessed by all students. Students participate in extra-curricular and cultural activities. The student union is a democratically elected student body which oversees student participation in all student related activities of the college. The college has an annual college week where students participate in games and sports, cultural, debating, indoor sports etc. Students also participate in national and state level sports, cultural and other competitions receiving awards and recognitions. Students also elect student of the year which carries a cash award and a citation. The college NSS and NCC are very active, organizing many activities within an academic year.

CRITERION VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP & MANAGEMENT

An institute in order to develop and be successful requires good governance, leadership and a good management system. Accordingly, the top management, the college and the Principal lay emphasis on the holistic education of students and the continuous learning of the faculty members. Adopting a pro-active approach, the top management ensures the democratic participation of all stakeholders in formulation and implementation of the action plans pertaining to academic and other matters. The policies and plans of the college are periodically monitored for both the academic and financial aspects through appropriate forums such as Governing Body, Staff Council, Departmental meetings and College Committees. The delegation of authorities through committee system, the planning and management, financial transparency and innovations are the strength of the college authority.

The college also grooms leadership among the faculties, staff and students. Faculties are appointed in committees, students body in charge, organizers in college activities to develop a leadership techniques under the guidance of the Principal and senior faculties. The college provides platform for grooming student leadership via the Students Union, Students clubs, NSS, NCC and so on. The college functions in a fairly decentralized manner as reflected in the democratic functioning of the staff council, delegating authority further through constitution of societies, committees and departmental committees.

The college has a good appraisal and report system. IQAC plays an important role in the development and planning of college activities. Each department has IQAC departmental coordinators.

CRITERION VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

The college has the largest forest inside Aizawl City. This reflects the status of the college in environmental consciousness and conservation throughout the ages. The college also has 10 KVA solar energy, UPS system, rain water harvest system, waste disposal mechanism etc. to make an environmental friendly campus. Students' consciousness and participation plays an important role in environmental conservation.

Innovative methods of teaching adopted at the college include technological innovations and innovations in conventional teaching methods. The use of technology like LCD/LED projectors, smart board, video shows, web based learning resource, students presentation, students database, computer laboratories etc are introduced. These technological innovations have their advantages and disadvantages. Faculty training in these fields is important. Another strategy drawn to improve learning methods includes the traditional approach. Traditional methods of teaching-lecture cum discussion method of teaching are the main method of teaching. Recent innovations include on-the-spot lecture system, introduction of co-curricular activities at the academic time table, students exchange and students trainings.

Research and capacity building is one of the strength of the institute. Good percentages of the faculties are with doctorate degree with a good number of faculties pursuing their further studies. Research projects and research scholars are working inside the campus with a good research environment provided by the administration. The college also organizes exposure programmes in terms of Seminars, workshops, study tours, field visit etc which leads to the overall developments of the students and the faculties.

Pachhunga University College is the only college in Mizoram that offers three streams of studies, viz., Arts, Science and Commerce. The college faculty members regularly involved themselves in various curriculum developments. Since the college is the constituent college of Mizoram University, the faculty of the college plays an important role in development of the Undergraduate Syllabus of Mizoram University.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

The college is the only constituent college of Mizoram University and it follows the rules and regulations of the Undergraduate Degree rules laid down by the University.

All head of the Departments and several faculty members of the college are involved in the curriculum development of the University as members of board of studies/school board. The Principal, Vice-Principal and president of PUC teachers association being members of the Academic council of Mizoram University, are actively involved in the process of approval of UG curriculum.

The college faculty members have been playing an important role in curriculum development ever since the transition from annual system to semester system in 2011. To provide a framework for the semester system, different departments conducted faculty meetings for input into the new syllabus. Many departments were instrumental in laying down the framework of the syllabus adopted by the Mizoram University.

Processes and measures taken for effective implementation of the curriculum are as follows:

- 1) The college's Academic Committee regularly held meeting at the beginning of each semester to look into the academic calendar and curriculum transaction.
- 2) Faculty meeting on curriculum development.
- 3) Allocation of courses for curriculum transaction at departmental level.
- 4) Semester plans (work book) prepared by faculty.
- 5) Semester plans cross checked by the Principal.
- 6) Faculty class log book system in place.
- 7) Faculty log book countersigned by Vice-Principal.
- 8) Proper briefing of all students at departmental level with pre-prepared powerpoint presentation at the beginning of every academic year.

Mizoram University in 2015 as per UGC guidelines introduced Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) to be implemented from 2016. Faculties of Pachhunga University College participated in the University departmental meetings for CBCS.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

Procedural support:

- Mizoram University appoints faculties of every departments as members of Board of Studies and School Boards.
- The college being a constituent college of the University, faculties are involved in the UG regulation system. For example the university used to invite faculties of the college in the development, framing and improvement of curriculum.
- Compulsory faculty meeting are conducted at the beginning and end of each semester to preview and review the academic session.
- Work book for each semester prepared by each faculty member.
- A review of the completed syllabus was conducted at head of department meetings.

Practical Support:

- The college provides a log book to each department.
- The college provides a diary and a pen to each faculty member.
- IQAC provides a record book and a photo album to each department.
- Each department has the freedom to purchase departmental requirements, including books, with the approval of the Principal.
- The college provides a laptop to each department for ICT based teaching.
- The college has a provision for inviting experts to give lectures and speak on the latest trends in their areas of specialization/work-experience.
- The college provides a separate room for each department along with decent individual bookshelves and lockers.
- Suggested reading materials are also kept in the department for easy and quick reference.
- Faculty members are encouraged to organize and attend seminars and workshops.
- Faculties are allowed to attend faculty development programmes such as winter and summer schools.

- The college and faculty members publish books and practical manuals based on the university curriculum.

- Counseling of students based on students' performance are conducted during CCA class.

1.1.7 Does the institution develop curriculum for any of the courses offered (other than those under the purview of the affiliating university) by it? If 'yes', give details on the process ('Needs Assessment', design, development and planning) and the courses for which the curriculum has been developed.

The Institution develops curriculum on the following courses:

- 1. The Certificate Course in Pisciculture,
- 2. Certificate Course in Human Rights,
- 3. Finishing School (Personality development) and
- 4. Diploma course in mushroom cultivation

The process of curriculum development except for the Certificate Course in Finishing school includes:

- 1. Host department/coordinator meeting on curriculum framing and designing
- 2. Appointing external expert to be a member of the local syllabus framing.
- 3. Review of the syllabus by the concerned board. Eg. Board of studies for Diploma course in Mushroom Cultivation.
- 4. Presentation of the syllabus and approval of the course at the Mizoram Academic Council Meeting.

1.1.8 How does institution analyze/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

The curriculum implementation are monitored by the following process:

- 1. Academic committee consisting of all head of department.
- 2. Each head of department is responsible for syllabus completion report at academic committee
- 3. Each faculty is responsible for completing his/her syllabus.
- 4. Departments are responsible for revision and analysis of old questions.
- 5. Academic committee report, revise and maintain a road map so that courses can be completed by the stipulated time.
- 6. Special class or remedial class are organized by concerned departments if and when required.

1.2. ACADEMIC FLEXIBILITY

1.2.1 Specifying the goals and objectives give details of the certificate/diploma/skill development courses etc., offered by the institution.

The college conducts Certificate/Skill-based courses and training. Different courses conducted during 2011-15 are:

- 1. **Certificate Course in Pisciculture:** This is a **UGC sponsored** Career Oriented Certificate Course on Pisciculture which started in 2008 and ended in 2013. The course duration is 6 months and entry level for the course is class XII. This certificate course is conducted by the Department of Zoology.
- 2. **Certificate Course in Human Rights**: This course is a **UGC sponsored** course and is conducted by the Department of Political Science. The course was sanctioned on 13th December 2012 and it started from 2013-14 academic sessions. Entry level for the course is Class XII.
- 3. **UGC Coaching Class**: The College conducts UGC sponsored coaching for graduate entry level into services. During 2011 and 2014 the college conducted three coaching programs, in which more than 260 students participated. This course is conducted under UGC cell.
- 4. **Certificate Course in Introduction to Humanities:** The department of English organized a college-funded 3 months Certificate Course in Introduction to Humanities from 29th October to 15th December. The course was opened for 1st Semester students belonging to the school of humanities. This course had six courses contained in the syllabus namely English Literature, Visual Art: Painting, Language: Mizo, Musicology, World Religion and Philosophy.
- 5. **Bank Recruitment Training**: The course is hosted by the Department of Mathematics. This is organized in collaboration with Mahindra Coaching Academy. The course is aimed at helping candidates get jobs in banking services. Entry level for the course is class XII and graduate level.
- 6. **Finishing School:** The college conducts a finishing school for final year students. This course is mainly for personality development. This is a self-financed course.
- 7. **Studentship Training**: The College conducts and hosts DBT Sponsored Studentship training for Post-Graduate students. This training is hosted by the Institutional Biotechnology Hub, Department of Zoology. The main aim of the training is to prepare students for future research and job-oriented training.
- 8. **Student training on Modern Biotechnology**: The Department of Zoology hosted this programme under Institutional Biotechnology Hub and DBT Star College Scheme. Hands-on training is conducted for one week on DNA extraction and amplification to prepare students for their further studies. This has been conducted every year since 2012.
- 9. **Student projects:** Departments covered by DBT STAR College Scheme conduct student research projects. Some of these projects are published in journals and presented in seminars.
- 10. **Internet & PowerPoint training**: Students are trained to make and use PowerPoint presentations for their class assignments. The training includes basic internet browsing, information retrieval, basic DTP and presentation.
- 11. **ICT Training**: The College also conducts a computer training course 'Course On Computer Concepts' for all IInd and IIIrd year students of the

- college in collaboration with DOAECC society, Zuangtui. A total of about 120 students registered for the course. It was held during August to December 2011.
- 12. **BPO-Call centre training**: The College also conducted a three months BPO Call Centre Training programme (July-Sept, 2011) for 30 students, especially Hostel boarders. The programme was jointly organized by the College with Shree Ram New Horizon India Ltd funded by North Eastern Council (NEC). The training was successfully completed by 30 students.
- 13. **Faculty training on Modern Teaching Techniques**: The college conducts a Faculty Training on Modern Teaching Techniques for senior faculty members.
- 14. Karate Class: As part of its physical education program the college introduced Karate lesson for students and family members of the college staff. The Karate course in the college is organized in collaboration with the All Mizoram Karate Association (AMKA). The college currently engages Mr. C. Dosavunga, Vth Dan Black Belt, AMKA to provide Karate lesson to the students.
- 15. **Diploma Course in Mushroom Cultivation**: This course under UGC Community College Scheme is to be conducted from 2015-16 Session. Entry level is class XII and the number of students per course is fixed at 50.

1.3 CURRICULUM ENRICHMENT

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

- Faculty members attended Mizoram University curriculum development training.
- Seminars, workshops, competitions, field trips, PowerPoint presentations, and video shows are held thus enhancing and supplementing the curriculum.
- Excursions and visits to historical sites, research institutes (IIT, ISI, BARC, NEHU, MZU, RIPANS etc), libraries, offices and organizations, the Mizoram Legislative Assembly and Aizawl Municipal Council where on-the-spot lectures are held.
- Publication of a students' newsletter which contains articles written by students themselves.
- Publication of proceedings of seminars.
- Village adoption project and awareness programs.
- Publication of books based on curriculum by faculties of the college
- Publication of practical manuals.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

The university has a regulation of revising the syllabus at every 4 years interval. These revisions include the changes required by the employment market. Input by the Principal in designing semester system for the university, university college calendar and Mizoram University Principal meetings. Since the college is the constituent college of Mizoram University all departments have representatives in the BOS and School Board of the University which enables the college to make input in curriculum designing and changing of the syllabus contents. The college also holds various academic association meetings which suggest curriculum requirements of the University.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

The college holds international, national, state and college level seminars/workshop and symposia in cross cutting issues like suicide prevention, biodiversity conservation, environmental awareness, human rights, education policy, etc. In an attempt towards creating awareness the college has a Women's Cell, Legal Cell, IT and Website committee, Eco club, Red Ribbon Club, Cultural Club, etc. which are meant to broaden an individual's mental horizons.

1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?

- **Finishing School:** The self-sponsored certificate course is aimed at personality development. The motto of the course "to be a better human" is the central theme aimed at student's quality improvement.
- **Moral and ethical values:** The College promotes moral and ethical values through students' semester briefing & CCA classes. The Principal also conducts programs like "*Meet the Principal*" in which he addresses students and impresses on them the need for moral reformation, self-appraisal and ethical values.
- **Community Orientation:** In pursuance of its motto "*Learning and Service*", the College has a community service programme.
 - a. The college adopted Phulpui village as a part of its community outreach program.
 - b. The service rendered by the NSS unit of the college is well known and the college has received awards and accolades for the highest number of voluntary blood donations.
 - c. Students' contribution in terms of charity events organized by them also serves as a good example of community service.
 - d. The Student Evangelical Union organizes charity events and raises money to help orphanages within Mizoram.
 - e. The College also has a strong Student Self-Support Union which encourages and supports its members who have to earn a living while attending classes. Members of the SSU have received award for "Best Self-Supporting Students" which is conferred by the Mizoram Student Self-Support Union.
 - f. The college also has a programme "Earn While Learn" Scheme to support students with poor financial backgrounds. This is especially helpful for the BPL community.
- The college conducts an "on the spot" lecture series in collaboration with communities/villages in order to enable students to appreciate their rich cultural heritage.
- Ecological Conservation Awareness: The college organized ecological conservation awareness programme for neighboring localities in collaboration with the Department of Forest & Environment, Government of Mizoram. Faculty members of the college regularly give lectures and special classes to nearby Forest Training Institutions.
- Counseling service: The college conducts moral and career counseling through certified counselors and local church pastors. Departments regularly conduct counseling for students as part of the CCA programme.
- 1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

Feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum are taken from:

- **Students**: All students of the college are required to fill in a 'Teacher Assessment' form which is conducted by IQAC. Each evaluated teacher is informed about their strengths and weaknesses through a confidential letter sent by the Principal.
- Parents: Through PTA meeting
- **Alumni**: The Alumnus of the college regularly provides feedback to the Institution.
- **Experts**: The college also has an Advisory Committee comprising experts from various fields who plan and advise the college on future developments.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?:

The IQAC monitors and reviews the academic performances, class distribution and students' performances. IQAC also monitors and evaluates the departmental performances in examinations, providing feedback to the Principal. IQAC has organized three college-level faculty workshops on departmental performances and future plans.

A departmental evaluation meeting is held at the Principal's chamber where results and students' performances are analyzed. The faculty members put forward their plans of action for improvement of their respective departments and also air their grievances, if any.

The Vice-Principal monitors the classroom activities of the College. He visits classrooms and monitors the timing of entry of faculty members into the classrooms. He monitors and countersigns the departmental log book.

The Head of Department monitors and distributes the work schedule for each faulty member, assigning students for counseling and monitoring their performances.

1.4 FEEDBACK SYSTEM

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

Faculty members of the college sit on the Board of Studies and the School Board of Mizoram University. The college also has representation in Academic Council and Executive Council. The college hosts Academic Departmental Association meetings in which the faculty of other colleges participates to discuss the University curriculum. The college also holds faculty interaction in syllabus framing before final submission to Board of Studies of the University.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

Yes. Faculty members provide feedback on the curriculum in case any syllabus modification or changes occur from the University. Parents provide feedback during PTA meetings; the same is passed on to the University by faculty members who are

members of the BOS. At the college level, new programs and enrichment courses have been introduced.

- 1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?)
- **1. Environmental Science, 2011**: Department of Environmental Science was introduced. This is the first and only UG Environmental Science course in Mizoram.
- **2. Biotechnology, 2011:** The college started a self-financed course on UG Biotechnology course. The course was started in order to meet the demand by students. Admission to this department is highly sought after.

CRITERION II TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

To achieve the college objective - To impart quality knowledge through effective teaching and to produce competent graduates in arts, science and commerce - Pachhunga University College strives to achieve excellence in the teaching and learning process through a free, fair and transparent system of evaluation.

2.1 STUDENT ENROLMENT AND PROFILE

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

Publicity

Pachhunga University College is the premier college of Mizoram and so admission to the institution is highly sought after. Information regarding the admission process is given through the college's notice board, website, social media (face book college group) and local TV. A **live phone-in programme** was aired on Doordarshan Kendra before the opening of the admission process in 2015.

Transparency

Pachhunga University College introduced new admission regulations from the 2012-13 session onwards to provide a transparent and fair process of selection. Under this new regulation, the entire admission process has been centralized, thus ensuring greater transparency. All selected candidates are notified on the college notice board and college website along with the total score of each students based on the criteria for calculation laid down by the admission regulation 2012. Complaint system is available and the admission team checks any data when and where required. All sorting of the applicants marks and total score are done through computer to ensure accuracy in the process.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.

Some regulation of the college in admission procedure are as follows:

A. Admission period: Admission is opened for a period of ten working days, taking the next day of publication of HSSLC results of Mizoram Board of School Education as the first day. The prescribed application form for admission should be duly filled up, accompanied by relevant documents and submitted to the college on or before the 10th day of the admission period. If a student fails to attend at least one of the first five classes, his/her admission shall be considered cancelled without any further notice.

- **B.** Cut off marks: Students who have obtained 50% and above in their Class XII or HSSLC examination are eligible to apply for admission.
- **C. Selection criteria**: Selection of applicants will be based on class 12 marks as per the following criteria:
- (I) If an applicant opts for any of the subjects taken by him/her in Class XII as Core subject:
 - (a) 60% weightage will be given to total marks obtained in Class XII (total marks obtained divided by full mark x 60)
 - (b) 40% weightage will be given to marks obtained in proposed core subject in Class XII (total marks obtained in proposed core subject divided by full mark x 40)
 - (c) Total Score = (a) + (b)
- If Physics is chosen as a Core subject
 - (a) 60% weightage will be given to marks obtained in Physics in Class XII (total marks obtained in Physics divided by full mark x 60)
 - (b) 40% weightage will be given to marks obtained in Mathematics in Class XII (total marks obtained in Mathematics divided by full mark x 40)
 - (c) Total Score = (a) + (b)
- (II) If an applicant opts for a Core subject which was not offered in Class XII the candidate may select any subject of his/her choice as the core subject even if he/she had not studied that subject at the higher secondary school level. In such a case the following calculations will be applied:

For Philosophy as Core subject

- (a) 60% weightage will be given to total marks obtained in Class XII (*Total marks obtained divided by full mark x 60*)
- (b) 40% weightage will be given to marks obtained in English in Class XII (total marks obtained in English divided by full mark x 40)
- (c) Total Score = (a) + (b)

For Statistics as Core subject

- (a) 60% weightage will be given to total marks obtained in Class XII (*Total marks obtained divided by full mark x 60*)
- (b) 40% weightage will be given to marks obtained in Mathematics in Class XII (*total marks obtained in Mathematics divided by full mark x 40*)
- (c) Total Score = (a) + (b)

For Geology, Biotechnology and Environmental Science as Core subject 100% weight age to aggregate marks
(Total marks obtained divided by full mark x 100)

For subjects other than Philosophy, Statistics, Geology, Biotechnology and Environmental Science as Core subject:

- (a) 100% weightage to aggregate marks (Total marks obtained divided by full mark x 100)
- (b) Minus 3% marks
- (c) Total Score = (i) + (ii)

- **D. Direct admission:** Direct admission will be given on a first-come first-serve basis to students provided they fulfill the required criteria outlined below:
 - (i) In arts: Candidates who have passed Class XII (Arts) in first division, securing at least 65% marks in aggregate and obtaining 65% in both English and the subject opted for as Core. Candidates fulfilling the criteria for direct admission will be given admission only with the approval of the Principal.
 - (II) In commerce: Candidates who have passed Class XII (Commerce) in first division, obtaining at least 60% both in Business Study and Accountancy Papers. Candidates fulfilling the criteria for direct admission will be given admission with the approval of the Principal.
 - (iii) In science: No direct admission will be available in the case of Science subjects.
- **E. Publication of selection results**: The list of selected candidates as well as the mode of payment of fees, are posted on the college notice board as well as on the college web-site (www.pucollege.in) two days after the closing of the admission period.
- **F. Applying for more than one subject**: Students applying for admission in more than one subject should use separate application forms, indicating their preferences as "first choice", "second choice", and so on. However, all such admission forms should be accompanied by the necessary documents.

G. Reservation of seats:

Reservation will be made for:

- (a) Children of employees of PUC & MZU 7 %
- (b) Physically challenged candidates 3 %
- (c) Sports/National level candidates 3%
- (d) The underprivileged sections viz. ST, SC and OBC as per Government of India Rules.

Process of Admission:

- The college creates an Admission Help-Desk during the first two weeks of the start of admission to facilitate, counsel and help admission seekers. Each department appoints one faculty member each day to this Admission Help Desk.
- Students submit their applications to Internet Resource Centre for data entry.
 Each student's score is calculated on the basis of a pre-formatted data entry system. Each student's total score is calculated based on their records.
- First list of candidates who have obtained admission based on merit is released.
- The second and final list of selected candidates based on merit is released.
- All candidates seeking admission under quotas are admitted after the second list
 of candidates is released. If the number of such applicants is more than the
 number of allotted seats, the candidates are interviewed by a special committee.
- Students applying for a seat in the hostel are screened and interviewed by the Hostel Committee.
- BPL admission is at the discretion of the Principal. The needs of each student and their academic potential are the criteria which determine such admissions.



2.2 CATERING TO STUDENT DIVERSITY

2.2.1. How does the institution cater to the needs of differently- abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The college makes provision for direct admission to students who fall under the category of People with Disabilities (PWD). 3% of the total seats i.e. 24 seats are allocated each year. Such students must have the relevant certificate issued by the State/ Central Government.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes, Steps taken by the college during and immediately after admission:

- **Counseling**: The Principal gives a short briefing and counseling to all those students admitted to the 1st semester.
- **Remedial course**: The IQAC identifies those areas or subjects where remedial coaching is required for the students. Remedial coaching is held for General English and Chemistry subjects.
- 2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Addon/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?:
 - The first day of the college is set aside for providing a briefing and counseling session to the newly admitted students. A Power-Point template prepared by the IQAC is used for this purpose.
 - Remedial coaching/bridge course to all students having Chemistry as a subject combination.

- Identification of slow learners and advance learners in English department through proficiency test. Students are grouped according to their score for effective teaching and learning.
- A department-wise library orientation session is held for the newly admitted students every year.
- Imparting basic IT knowledge to students having Zoology as a subject combination.
- Counseling is given to the students based on their attendance, and performances in the internal and semester examinations.
- Inviting resource persons from outside to give lectures on their area of expertise.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

STAFF

- The Principal address such sensitive issues during staff meeting and interaction programmes.
- The college organizes environmental awareness campaigns in which the college staff participate.
- The college staff and cleaners are made aware of the need for a litter free campus.
- The college's Women's Cell addresses any issues relating to gender discrimination.

STUDENTS

- Value added programmes are conducted by the department during CCA classes.
- The college has an Eco Club which organizes and participates in environmental awareness programmes.
- Students are sensitized about these issues through the NCC, NSS.
- Students are also sensitized on such issues during mentor-mentee interactions.
- Students participate in the environmental cleanup programmes. Students are motivated to keep a clean and litter-free environment in their class rooms and laboratories.
- Social media campaign and awareness through college facebook groups.
- Students are instructed to approach the Women's Cell in case they encounter any sexual harassment.
- Eve-teasing is strictly prohibited in the college and students are informed of the same.
- Anti-ragging campaigns are held in girls and boys hostel. Anti-ragging regulations and information hoardings are placed in specific locations of the college.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

Advanced learners are identified through the student tracking system which monitors the students' continuous assessment, performance in the semester and class attendance. Students are counseled based on their performances. Individual students are called for counseling sessions in their respective departments. The mentoring system enables the faculty to identify strong learners and weak learners.

Students are provided with an opportunity to prove themselves in class seminars and departmental seminars. In departments where STAR college projects are activated, advance learners even publish papers based on their research project. Students also present papers in State level seminars. Advance learners even participate in Regional and National level workshop. Weak students are provided with materials as per their individual requirements.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

The academic performance of students is evaluated based on:

- Their continuous assessment marks and performance.
- Their class attendance.
- Their semester performances.

Students are made aware of their academic performance through the following procedures:

- 1. Student monthly attendance and performance in continuous assessment are displayed on the departmental notice board and common notice board.
- 2. Re-evaluation of students' papers and marks based on student complaint, if any, at the departmental level.
- 3. Allocation of marks based on attendance.
- 4. Current status of student's performances are informed and discussed at PTA meetings.
- 5. On the spot practical assessment based on classroom performance.
- 6. Assessment through PowerPoint presentation and assignments.
- 7. Through Counseling.
- 8. IQAC result analysis and department result analysis.
- 9. Student's database and their academic performances are recorded and distributed to department for counseling and records.
- 10. Special arrangements are made for PWDs during examinations.

2.3 TEACHING-LEARNING PROCESS

- 2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)
 - The academic calendar is prepared by the Principal and deliberated and approved by the Academic Committee before the start of the academic session which is notified and also published in the prospectus

- A departmental meeting is convened at the beginning of each semester to deliberate on the semester action plans and activities.
- The college class schedule and classroom allocation is prepared by the Department of Mathematics and approved by the Principal
- The students are informed about schedules regarding the continuous assessment test at the beginning of each semester.
- Each faculty prepares workbook before commencement of every semester which contains the semester lesson plan.
- All evaluation system is made transparent by placing student's marks on departmental notice board.
- Students' attendance is displayed on the notice board for information and complaints if necessary.
- A syllabus completion report is submitted by teachers to the head of department.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process? IQAC promotes facilitation and improvement of the teaching-learning process. The following steps have been taken up:

- IQAC initiates and facilitates the organization of International, National, State and College level Seminars/Workshops/Symposia. Relevant departments are paired with their sister departments within the college. IQAC also appoints a coordinator and secretary to facilitate in the events organized. This improves the faculty quality and exposure. Student participation in these events is made compulsory to enhance their learning process.
- IQAC works with the library staff in automation and improvement of College library. This has been completed and is functioning
- IQAC organizes a one day seminar on departmental annual review and discussion of future plans for the college.
- IQAC organizes an orientation programme for newly recruited faculty of the college.
- IQAC in collaboration with the Project Committee organizes a Research Sensitization Programme. It encourages faculty members to undertake Major and Minor Research Projects and to pursue Ph.D.
- IQAC organized a one day programme on UGC PBAS system.
- Improvement in classroom infrastructure, renovation of classrooms and laboratories proposed by IQAC have been implemented.
- Infrastructure development to support teaching-learning process by introducing teaching aids for teachers like laptops, LCD projectors, electronics interactive boards and Wi-Fi internet connectivity.
- Improvement in internet connectivity is done via the NIC Cell, Government of Mizoram.
- Installation of a proper sound system in large lecture halls.
- Re-allocation of class rooms and teachers' room. For better tutor-ward relationship, each Department's office will be located in close proximity to the classrooms in which the classes are held.
- Providing better notice boards for each department.
- Installation of tinted glass in selected classrooms.
- IQAC proposed the setting up of a language laboratory for the college. This has been implemented.

- Infrastructure improvement & Decoration- Creativity, etc & Cleanliness etc and Building Committee.
- Creation of flower gardens- Beatification & Cleanliness Committee
- Publications by departments and the college- publication of course-based books, practical manuals and seminar proceedings.
- More students' exposure programmes are being implemented.
- Imparting basic IT knowledge to students is done by the IT Committee based on instruction from IQAC.
- Introducing IQAC departmental Annual Report System.
- Students' database has been created and is running.
- Creation of Departmental websites and uploading study materials in such websites.
- Environmental awareness campaign organized by the college and by the Environmental Science department.
- Parents Teacher Association is formed in many departments for feedback and counseling.
- Introduction of CCA programme in the routine for the implementation of Departmental counseling, gender sensitization campaign, value based and moral education programme, organizing college programmes without disturbing normal classes.
- Analysis of feedback on all aspects of teaching and learning. All faculties are assessed and the result of such analysis with faculty strength and weakness are passed on to each faculty.
- Village adoption proposed and completed. This was mutually beneficial for both parties.
- Dissemination of important academic information to departments.
- Activities entrusted to the Committees are carried out according to the Year Plan.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

Physical infrastructure attributes:

- Physical arrangements are made to be more student centric. Departmental
 faculty rooms have been re-organized for better student-teacher interactions.
 Every department faculty rooms are placed adjacent to their Core students for
 easy access, better interaction, counseling and consultation.
- Internet Resource Centre- The college has a dedicated Internet Resource Centre with 18 internet-enabled PCs, and printing facility. Students can browse the internet, and work on their presentations and assignments. Students are allowed to print their documents free of cost.
- Creation of Computer laboratory, GIS laboratory and Language laboratory.
- The college has a high speed internet connection which enables faculty and students to access journals and download study materials. Wi-Fi internet is available in each department. The college also has six free Wi-Fi centers for students which is free of cost for the students who have registered their gadgets.

• Students are trained in the Institutional Biotechnology Hub which prepares them for further studies.

TECHNOLOGICAL INNOVATION

- Lecture-cum-discussion method supplemented by the use of PowerPoint and video materials from Khan Academy, YouTube, academic films and documentary shows, etc are mainly used for classroom teaching.
- The college has installed LCD/LED projector in all classrooms which allows the presentation of text, audio, graphics or video. This is more interesting for the students and improves the likelihood that they will comprehend the lessons.
- Models and charts are used where required.
- Faculty training on use of ICT is organized. Senior faculty members are given training on how to use the internet and give PowerPoint presentations.

STUDENTS EXPOSURE

- Subject-related special talks, workshops and seminars are organized by the college and the individual departments.
- Study tours and exposure programmes are organized by the college. The college organizes 28 National/ Regional study tours and 27 study tours/field visit inside state.
- Micro projects are conducted by departments covered by the DBT-STAR College Scheme. These projects are not in the University curricula. These projects are published in journals and seminar proceedings.

STUDENT AWARDS

- The college has special awards given to outstanding students. Two merit awards are sponsored by the Ex-Principals of the college: HK Bawichhuaka Proficiency Award for the highest mark scorer in Arts and Dr. H Lallungmuana Award for the highest mark scorer in Science. Beginning in 2015, the Koinonia Award is sponsored by Dr. H Lalthangliana to felicitate top rank holders in Sociology department. Many departments have introduced departmental awards to honour students with ranks in the University Examination.
- The college also has a *Student of the Year* award. Mr. Vanlalhriatrenga Chhangte, Asst. Controller of Mines at Indian Bureau of Mines, has been sponsoring a sum of Rs. 12345/- for this award from 2013 onwards.
- The college has provision for scholarships to students. Apart from the Tribal Scholarship from the ministry of Tribal affairs, GOI, other scholarships are organized in collaboration with private firms and companies. Such scholarships include the Sitaram Jindal Foundation Merit scholarship for Below Poverty Line (BPL) students, UGC Special Merit Scholarship for Students in North-East Region (*Ishan Uday*), Sunflower Electronics fellowship for Mathematics and Physics, Zoram Educational Trust Fellowship for Physics.
- The college has a Students Aid fund. This fund is for students in need who apply for the fund. A maximum of Rs.5000.00 is given by the office in consultation with the Students Union leaders.

- The college also has a scheme to help financially backward students through the "Earn while Learn" scheme.
- Many departments have also sponsored the travelling expenses of some students with poor financial backgrounds, if and when they join higher studies.
 Some faculties have financially helped students with poor financial backgrounds during the admission process.

INSTITUTIONAL PRACTICES AND GOVERNANCE

- The college adopted a new system after the shift to the semester system which follows the examination pattern of the university. This uniqueness in Continuous assessment system leads to better preparation of students in External Examination.
- The college places great emphasis on student mentoring. Students' mentoring and counseling is done during the CCA class and is tailored to meet the individual requirements of each student. The CCA class is also utilized for departmental and other college club related activities.
- Students are provided with the contact numbers of faculty members at the beginning of the semester. The same is also given to the parents during the PTA meeting.
- All sanctioned posts, with the exception of those posts newly sanctioned by the UGC in late 2015, are filled. The smooth academic functioning of the college is ensured by the Principal who reviews the departmental faculty requirements at the start of each semester.
- The college ensures that practical courses prescribed by the University syllabus can be conducted by the college. At the beginning of each semester, departmental requirements are submitted by each head of department.
- Faculty meetings are organized by IQAC to review departmental performances and divulge information to all departments about other department performances.
- IQAC result analysis system provides good insight regarding departmental and students' performances. The follow up meeting organized by the Principal leads to an improvement in departmental performances and thus good result by students.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

- The college adopted assignment to students for their internal evaluation. Individual or group assignments are given to students which are prepared by the students.
- PowerPoint presentation assignments are given to students. This enables the students to prepare and present their own slides. Faculty checks the originality of their presentations.
- Students have their own bulletin which in published by the Students Union. Some departments have their own bulletin prepared and published by the students
- Students are assigned projects guided by the faculty. The enables students to make an independent study which help them in their thinking process.

- Apart from curricula based study tour programmes, the college has a policy of
 organizing exposure programme by individual departments. In this policy the
 students themselves are given opportunity to earn for their tours. Students
 organize earning schemes in their spare time. The remainders of their
 requirements are provided by the college.
- The College adopts Phulpui Village. Students are exposed to the study along with the faculties. Students themselves taught in the schools and also conduct environmental awareness campaign.
- Book review system is introduced in some departments.
- Invited lecture and discussion on current relevant topics are organized by the departments to enhance the thinking process of the students.
- In DBT STAR College scheme, UGC Career oriented programmes and UGC Certificate course in Human rights, students are assigned individual and group projects. Some good results of the projects are published in scientific journals with ISBN.
- Student's presentation in a State level seminar: Students projects are presented in a State level seminar/workshop organized by the college.
- Students Exchange programme are also organized by the college. Department of Chemistry Union Christian College, Shillong and Pachhunga University College jointly organized State level Seminars in both the college. Students and faculty present their papers, organize discussion. This provide s good platform for upbringing scientific temperament amongst students.
- Field study cum exposure programmes are organized by the department of Zoology to study and visit local laboratories which are not available in the College. Institute visited includes Regional Institute of Paramedical Sciences, Bioinformatics Centre, Biotechnology Department Mizoram University, and State fish seedling production centre, Lengpui.
- Institutional Biotechnology hub organized students exposure programme with Rural Colleges, organize staff and students training at these colleges. Students gave lecture and perform demonstration of equipments like PCR and Gel Electrophoresis.
- Various competitions on essay writing, painting, debating, and extempore speaking are held within the college. Students also participate in such competitions organized outside the college.
- 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The college has the following technologies for effective teaching and learning:

- 1. All departments are equipped with a PC, a printer and a laptop for effective teaching.
- 2. LCD/LED projectors in all classrooms and seminar halls. Two projectors are available at the Principal's office and Internet Resource Centre for common use.
- 3. Sound systems in big classrooms.

- 4. Interactive smart board.
- 5. Video shows available in departments.
- 6. Students' database with marks and performances available for effective counseling.
- 7. Internet Resource Centre funded by DST FIST and UGC, with 18 internetenabled PC, with a scanner and printer available for students.
- 8. High speed internet 100 mbps with Wired LAN, free Wi-Fi in all faculty rooms, and six free Wi-Fi centers for students within the campus.
- 9. Departmental websites available.
- 10. Language laboratory with 30 PCs and Sanako software.
- 11. Two GIS laboratories with 6 PCs each and Super map GIS 6 R Software.
- 12. All Science Department laboratories are well equipped.
- 13. Research Instrumentation Centre with sophisticated instruments.
- 14. Institutional Biotechnology Hub, sponsored by DBT, GOI equipped with molecular studies. Institutional Biotechnology Hub organizes students' training and exposure programmes.
- 15. Well equipped and fully automated library with Wi-Fi, along with adequate reading space for students and faculty members.
- 16. E-journals through UGC Inflibnet- N-List. E-journals are available on request through Bioinformatics centre, Mizoram University.
- 17. E-books available with IQAC and library.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

- The college organizes study tours and exposure programmes for students.(List of exposure programmes enclosed in criteria 2.3.8)
- On the spot lecture are organized at different places with historical significance, economic and tourism centre, etc.
- The college organizes international, national, state and college level workshops. Senior-most students are required to attend these workshops and seminars.
- Students deliver PowerPoint presentations in classrooms.
- Students work on projects specified by the curriculum and even outside the curriculum.
- Students' publication of projects works in journals Zoology and Chemistry.
- Presentation of project works in seminars/workshops Zoology and Chemistry.
- Students are exposed to community service through village adoption
- Students are taught to use and retrieve materials from the internet.
- Students participate in state-level debate and quiz competitions.
- Conducts courses certificate and job oriented courses for students.
- Conducts finishing school
- Students participate in national-level competitions.
- The college organizes two international, twenty four national and 30 state-level seminars and 44 College levelseminar/ workshops/ symposia/ special talks within 2011-15.
- The faculty members attended and presented in international and national and state-level seminars and workshops.

- Faculty members are encouraged to pursue further studies like M. Phil and Ph.D studies.
- Faculty members have research collaboration and publications with national and international universities and research institutions.
- Dr. K. Birla Singh, Department of Zoology, has received a DBT International Associateship at King's College, London. Dr. Khelchandra Singh, Department of Environmental Science has received a Chevening Scholarship Programme at Queen Mary's College, London. Dr. Lalramliana, Department of Zoology, has received a DBT National Associateship at Assam University, Silchar. Dr. Rohmingmawii, Department of History, has received an Associateship at the UGC Inter-University Centre for Humanities and Social Sciences (IUC), functioning at the Indian Institute of Advanced Study, Shimla.
- The college organizes training on ICT and modern teaching techniques for senior faculty members.
- The college organizes training for newly recruited faculty members.
- The college organizes a workshop on quality education.
- The college organizes a workshop on innovative techniques of teaching and learning.
- The college provides high speed internet and faculty members can access online journals through Inflibnet.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?

The college believes in the all-round development of students. The physical, mental and emotional well-being of the students is one of the priorities of the college. The activities and measures taken by the college to ensure the all-round developments of the students are:

- 1. A students mentoring system is practiced in the college
- 2. A CCA class has been introduced in the routine as a separate class. This class is utilized for students' counseling on academic performance, class attendance and moral education.
- 3. PTA meetings are held to discuss students' performances and to listen to parent/guardians' feedback.
- 4. The Principal organizes a "Meet the Principal" programme for newly admitted students where he motivates them.
- 5. The college has introduced a students' briefing at the beginning of every semester where freshers and seniors are reminded about the value system of the college.
- 6. The college has a separate career and counseling cell. Some activities of the Counseling Cell are:
 - a. Trained counselors (a professional psychiatrist and a doctorate degree holder in counseling) were employed and counseling sessions were made available for the students every Monday at 1:00 4:00 pm. A separate room for the counseling session is being maintained.

- b. Introduction of counseling service for the 2012-13 academic sessions was organized on 28th September, 2012 at the college auditorium. A team of experts headed by Dr. C. Lalhrekima (Medical Psychiatrist) were invited to interact with the students.
- c. Two students Mr. Dilip Kumar Chakma (4th Sem. Physics) and Mr. F. Vanlalremruatkima (4th Sem. Mathematics) were selected by the Career Guidance and Counseling Cell to attend CSIR programme for popularisation of science through media during 18-21 February, 2013 at CSIR-Jorhat.
- d. A seminar on 'Creation and Science' was held on 7th March, 2013 at room no.2 of Block II building in collaboration with EFFICOR, New Delhi. Selected 4th semester students from each department had a lively interaction with the representatives of EFFICOR.
- e. Ten students were sent from the college to attend the 'VISA for USA' seminar and interact with persons from the US Consul, organized by the Mizoram Chamber of Commerce and Industries (MCIC) on 16th April, 2013 at the MCIC Office.
- 2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The teaching and learning process has developed with the advancement of technology. Alternate approaches to the teaching-learning process have paved the way for innovative practices. Technological advancements in the college are:

- a. LCD projectors and laptops for innovative teaching methods: Pachhunga University College started using LCD projectors from the year 2007. Initially seven laptops and LCD projectors were procured from FIST fund sponsored by the Department of Science and Technology (DST) Govt. of India. In 2011-12 session, a laptop and a projector funded by the University Grants Commission (UGC –NERO) were given to all academic departments. All classrooms have ceiling mounted LCD projectors. Spare laptops and projectors are also available at the IRC and the Principal's office
- b. Internet for students and faculties: The college has an internal local area networks (LAN) provided by Mizoram University in 2008. The college has 20 internet connections using VPN over broadband connection provided by BSNL under MHRD NME-ICT project. The college internet connection was enhanced in 2015 with a high Speed 100 Mbps fibre optics connection from the NIC. The college has one Internet Resource Centre (IRC) funded by the UGC and the Department of Science and Technology, New Delhi. There are 20 PCs with internet connections and one printer available for students accessible during working hours free of cost. The college also offers six free wireless internet hotspots The College also conducts a certificate course in computer applications and BPO training for hostel students.
- c. **Web based learning**: The college website was officially launched in 2008. All departments were assigned a separate e-mail and departmental website

- in 2012. Each department can customize its own website. Many departments have uploaded various study materials so that students can access these materials from anywhere.
- d. **Students' database:** The college has a separate students' database which can be accessed through the local area network. The Students' Database system was designed by the faculty members of the Department of Mathematics. The college is the first college in Mizoram to implement such a system.
- e. **Computer laboratory:** The college has one computer laboratory with 30.
- f. **Language Laboratory**: The college also has one language laboratory to address the language problem faced by the students. This laboratory is equipped with a 6 kva UPS and 30 PCs with Sanako software.
- g. **GIS laboratory:** The college also has two Geographical Information System (GIS) laboratories to enable modern studies in the field.
- h. **Video show**: Each department has its own video teaching materials and documentaries.
- i. **On the spot lecture**: On the spot lecture are organized during field study. This helps the students familiarizing their studies.
- j. **Library orientation :** The college library organizes library orientation programme for each departments.
- k. **Departmental library:** The college provides bookshelf for the provision of maintaining departmental library.
- 1. **Co Curricular activities** (**CCA**): Integration of CCA in the academic routine is one of the best innovations in the college. This enables the departments, students union, clubs, NCC, NSS etc to organize programme which in other cases disturbs normal class routine. The co curricular activities of the students can also be enhanced. The balance between academic programme and co curricular activities can thus be maintained.
- m. Study tour/field visit/Library visit: Field visit- Local, regional and national are encouraged. There are departments where there tours are a part of the curricula. In many circumstances where the tours are Student and faculty contribution are matched by the college to enable students field visit. The list of study tours /exposure programmes organized are:

Effort by the Principal: The college administration emphasizes the importance of innovations in teaching methods amongst the faculty. The effort made by the Principal in fund allocation, application of funds from funding agencies, the allocation of funds for maintenance and repair of electronic equipments require a good understanding of the innovative techniques and modern teaching aids. The college is fortunate to have an innovative and computer literate Principal. The funding system of the college study tour is one of the major achievement of the Principal of the college.

Technical support: The college have a number of computers and electronic equipments as an innovative techniques. The college introduces in-house maintenance of these equipments as far as possible. This cut the expenditure in maintenance of the electronic equipments.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learningprocess?

The college library is the oldest institutional library in Mizoram with a well established book collection. It has 50554 books, 981 reference books, 40 journal subscriptions and a CD/DVD collection. The library is now fully automated with Soul 2.0 software.

- 1. The library's sizeable book collection helps in supplementing the classroom teaching.
- 2. The library has a reprographic section. Users can easily make photocopies of the library's books including books in the Reference section at cheap rates.
- 3. The important library services are automated so that users can have access without losing time using OPAC.
- 4. A separate reading room and printer are provided for faculty members.
- 5. A good journal section is established and maintained for students as well as faculty members encouraging them to further broaden their horizons.
- 6. Wi-Fi connectivity is provided for all users.
- 7. Using web-OPAC, teachers can easily give references to students.
- 8. The college library has a hard copy of all past examination question papers. The process of creating a question database is also under process.
- 9. Each department has a departmental library for the convenience of faculty members and students.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The faculty members give their utmost effort to complete the syllabus on time. They prepare a lesson plan for the semester which is countersigned by the Principal. A log book is maintained to record the number of classes taken by the teachers. The college faces minor challenges in completing the curriculum:

• **Sports activities**: A good number of working days in each semester are taken up by sports events such as College week and Inter College sports and the preparation for these events.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The following measures are taken by the college to monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching and learning:

- a. Through Academic committee review process.
- b. IQAC teacher assessment is conducted each year. All faculty members are given a letter on their current performance, which they can then compare with their past performance.
- c. The Principal and Vice-Principal conducts regular classroom visits to ensure that faculty members are present in the classroom as well as to ensure that classes are conducted in a timely manner.
- d. Result analysis is one of the most important method of evaluation of teaching learning process. IQAC prepares a detailed result analysis of the University examination and provides recommendations to the Principal.

- e. The principal conducts a departmental meeting with each department to review the results and motivate the faculty members.
- f. IQAC conducts annual review meeting to reflect on faculty performance and departmental performances.
- g. The principal organize faculty meeting at the start of each semester and before the start of examination. Meetings are also conducted on the need basis.
- h. Head of departments conducts faculty meetings and discussion.
- i. The college conducts Parents teacher meeting to monitor the progress of the students.
- j. Through counseling during CCA period.

2.4 TEACHER QUALITY

The college have 104 regular faculty out of which 60.57 % are doctorate degree holders, 2 M Phil and 37.5 % are P.G degree holders. - C. Arrangement of temporary faculties and Guest faculty: There are many faculty members availing leave for their research especially after the insistence on course work by the UGC. To ensure the smooth functioning of the college, the administration has provision for engaging temporary faculty and guest lecturers.
- **D. Research Initiatives:** The college promotes research among the faculty members. The college conducts a research monitoring and sensitization seminar. Research funds available with the funding agency are circulated by IQAC and aid in their application. The research grants during 2011-15 have increased many fold. The college has a separate Research and Project Committee to look after the research initiatives in the college.
- **E. Internal research funding:** The college also sanctioned Rs. 50,000 in 2010 to the Department of Zoology to start research activities at the Department. The project was completed in 2011. This initiative has led to the discovery of many new species of fish and laid the foundation for future studies. Similarly, the department of Botany was sanctioned Rs. 50,000 to study the plant diversity at the college campus in 2014. This led to the publication of a book *Cryptogamic Diversity of Pachhunga University College*.
- **F.** Research Instrumentation Centre: Due to an increase in research activities, the college administration constructed a Research Instrumentation Centre which is a self-financed centre. The administration ensures the growth of research and development of the college by providing necessary infrastructure for research in many departments, renovation and extension of departments to enable research activities which in turn motivates the faculty members to take up further studies.
- **G. Faculty Publication:** The college administration and IQAC inculcate the importance of publication among faculties. 2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

The evaluation of teachers by the students has been conducted by the IQAC every year starting from 2012. The faculty assessment provided by NAAC is modified as per the convenience of the college. Each departmental IQAC coordinator is responsible for the assessment. At the end of each assessment the performance of each faculty member is evaluated and a letter is sent by the Principal to each faculty member noticing their performance in the previous achievement and the assessment year.

2.5 EVALUATION PROCESS AND REFORMS

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

- The college has a separate Examination Cell.
- Students are informed about the examination system both internal and external examinations at the beginning of the semester. This is done through a PowerPoint presentation prepared by IQAC.
- Internal evaluation system and the time of the internal continuous assessment are notified in the college prospectus.
- The students are informed about the college's internal evaluation system. The college conducts three Continuous Assessment (CA). The average of best two out of the three tests are taken for their final internal marks.
- Parents are informed about the continuous assessment system during the PTA meetings.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The college adopts the Mizoram University Examination rules and regulations. Some of the reforms undertaken by the University are:

- Introduction of a semester system across all graduate studies from 2011 academic session.
- Introduction of a central evaluation system since 2012.
- Introduction of an internal evaluation of University practical examinations.
- Preparation for introduction of Choice Based Credit System (CBCS).
- Introduction of attendance marks and class performance marks as part of the internal assessment.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The college contributes to and implements the changes in the evaluation system through the following processes:

- The college is a role model for implementing the semester system.
- It is practically impossible for the colleges in Aizawl to directly submit their answer sheets to Mizoram University on a daily basis as it is far away from the heart of the city. Pachhunga University College is the venue for temporary submission of answer sheets from various colleges inside Aizawl. The answer sheets are kept securely in a strong room. Three members of the Examination Committee of the college are on duty for this purpose. This help in the centralization of the evaluation system.
- The college is the venue for central evaluation. The college is the only college within Aizawl to have enough infrastructures to hold the central evaluation.
- The administration encourages the faculty members to participate in the central evaluation. Faculty members make the central evaluation their priority so that the university evaluation is not delayed.
- Input by the Principal in the Principal's meeting and curriculum discussion.
- Input by the faculty members in Board of Studies and by the Members of the Academic council.

Effective Implementation of the Evaluation Reforms those Initiated by the Institution on its Own

• After the introduction of the semester system, the college adopted its own system of evaluation for internal assessment. The system follows the question pattern in the external University examination. The system of marks distribution adopted are:

- An option for a re-test is also laid down in the college regulations. The Principal, in consultation with the department concerned, can grant special permission for a retest.
- The college ensures transparency in the evaluation process. After evaluation, all internal examination papers are distributed to the students. All marks are displayed in the notice board. Students are given the opportunity to air their grievances, if any, in this regard.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

Formative Evaluation

- Continuous Assessment in all papers/semester including compulsory subject.
- Continuous Assessment consisting of two essay type questions.
- Compulsory MCQ in the internal examination.
- Submission of assignment: one per paper.
- Presentation of assignment papers through PowerPoint presentation.

- Introduction of micro research projects in DBT Star College Scheme.
- Presentation of research papers in seminars.
- Publication of papers in journals and magazines.
- Submission of study tour reports and field visit reports.

Summative Assessment

- An end semester examination (ESE) is conducted by the university.
- Theory consist of 75 marks ESE and 25 marks CAT in arts and commerce subjects without practical
- In science 55 marks for ESE, 15 marks for CAT, 10 marks CAT practical and 20 marks for Practical ESE.

Impact of the evaluation approach

- The college performs better under the semester system of education. This is reflected in the results.
- The number of rank holders from the college has increased.
- The Continuous Assessment Test method adopted by the college prepares the students for external examinations. This prepares students for the external examinations.
- The publication of papers and presentation of papers have increased students' confidence. Presentation of assignment through PowerPoint prepares the students for further studies and increases their confidence.

The college IQAC has a system of analyzing end semester exam results which is provided to all the departments for their evaluation. The departments are analyzed in two ways:

- 1. Departmental performance: This signifies the departmental students pass percentage, number of first division and fail percentage.
- 2. Subject wise performance. This signifies the subject wise performance especially in 1-4th semester elective and compulsory subjects.
- 3. All departments notify the students' internal marks in the notice board.
- 2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.

The college ensures rigor and transparency in internal assessment system.

- All Continuous Assessment (CA) are conducted under strict vigilance. Extra
 invigilators are detailed in compulsory subjects like English, Mizo, History
 of Science and Environmental Studies to ensure vigilance and smooth
 conduct of the exams.
- The detailed routine, room and invigilator arrangements are done by the Exam committee.
- The CA schedule and the system of examinations are explained in the college prospectus.
- The college adheres to the date set aside for exams in the calendar.

- The CA system followed by the college has not been changed since the implementation of the Semester system.
- Timely assessment of CA papers and showing the marks to the students for transparency.
- All students can complain to the teacher concerned, then the head of the concerned department and finally to the Principal in case of grievances.
- The academic committee reviews the internal test.

Weightage for overall development of students – behavioral aspect, independent learning and communication skills:

- Weightage is given to student's attendance and class performance. Students with good attendance and good behavior have a chance of good CP marks.
- Class performance indicates the students' performance in the unit/topic test/pop quiz and topic assignments.
- The third CA assignment test encourages the students to adopt their own system of thinking, resourcefulness and creativity.
- The third CA is also conducted through PowerPoint presentation which nurtures the student's communication skills.
- Practicals are assessed based on their performance in the class.

Student projects and presentations develop enhance the learning skills of the students. The college and the faculty use assessment as an indicator for evaluating student performances.

- The marks obtained by students in the CA enables teachers to effectively provide counseling to students as it indicates their strengths and weakness.
- Students, on the basis of their CA marks, can approach the teacher for advice.
- The student performances are evaluated by the head of the concerned department prior to analysis by the Academic committee.

2.5.6 What are the graduate attributes specified by the college/ affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

Yes, the Graduate Attributes of this college are expressed through each academic department, which sensitizes the students of what they are expected to acquire at the end of their courses. The implementation and outcome of these attributes are closely monitored by the faculty through mentoring, counseling, and through feedback from the stakeholders (alumni and parent-teacher interface).

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

College level

- The college has a Grievances Redressal Cell.
- Students are given the opportunity to review their internal marks and attendance percentage.

- Students are given the time to take up any complaints with the teacher concerned.
- If students are not satisfied with the redressal of their grievances, they can approach the Head of Department.
- If grievances are not redressed by the respective Head of Department, the Principal and the Grievances Redressal Cell are the ultimate authority to resolve any issue.

University level:

The university abides by the rules and regulation laid by the Academic Committee and the University regulation. Students can complain their marks at individual paper 10 days after the issue of Mark sheet by the college.

The college has adopted strategies related to teaching-learning-assessment and improved upon them over the years.

- The courses and the syllabus are framed by the University BOS. Faculty members of the college are members of these boards. Every department in the college has a representative member in the BOS in the University.
- The college organizes good exposure programmes for the students including study tours, special lectures and invited lectures, etc.
- The college organizes and conducts personality development programme, career oriented programmes, certificate courses to facilitate students in their learning outcome.
- The college's examination and evaluation system provides a good stringent system to promote healthy competition.
- The college regulation on internal assessment and evaluation provides stability to a systematic approach to learning.
- Organizing students' projects apart from their normal curricula enhances students learning and innovative thinking process.

2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

- The college organizes seminars, workshops and conferences on relevant topics.
- The college adopts a village with students' participation in the process.

- The college organizes and educates students on important topics like suicide, HIV aids awareness, drugs and alcohol abuse, etc.
- The college organizes programmes for environmental conservation with neighboring localities.
- Collaboration with local NGOs like Young Mizo Association, PRISM, etc to enhance the social participation of students.
- By organizing voluntary blood donation camps to instill the idea of self sacrifice- "tlawmngaihna" in Mizo language to the students. This "tlawmngaihna" is the pillar of Mizo society.
- By organizing training for students in Modern Biotechnology to enhance their research aptitude.
- By conducting research projects.
- Conducting extension programmes through the Institutional Biotechnology Hub to rural institutions with student presentations provides good innovative practices.

- Admission data provides insight to the future plans of the college admission procedure. Eg. Direct admission of Arts students was increased from 60% to 65 % in the consecutive years.

CRITERION III RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

The college promotes research amongst its faculties. The College is the only college in Mizoram having a research centre where Ph.D scholars are actively working for full time research. Faculty members are also engaged in research activities and some departments have consultancy and extension services. This clearly indicates the status of the college.

3.1. PROMOTION OF RESEARCH

3.1.1 Does the institution have recognized research centers of the affiliating University or any other agency/organization?

Yes, the college has well a established laboratory in all science departments and three laboratory in arts. Apart from laboratories, the college has two research centers:

- Research and Instrumentation Centre: There is a well equipped Research and Instrumentation Centre. The centre hosts four PhD scholars, three Junior Research Fellows and one DST Women Scientist.
- Institutional Biotechnology Hub: The college hosts the DBT Institutional Biotech Hub which was established in 2011 at the Department of Zoology. The Institutional Biotechnology Hub conducts training on biotechnology techniques for faculty members, belonging to the college and outside the college, research scholars, PG students, graduate students and also organizes an exposure programme for higher secondary students. The activities of the DBT Institutional Biotechnology Hub, Pachhunga University College are listed under criteria 3.1.6.

The college has a separate research committee known as "Project Committee' which was previously called "Project and IT committee." In 2014, it has been split into 'Project Committee' and 'IT and Website Committee'. The committee consists of:

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/ projects?

The college provides good atmosphere and facilitate necessary infrastructure and moral support to faculty members having research projects. There has been tenfold increase in the amount of research projects compared with the previous assessment period which clearly indicates facilitation and encouragement of the research scheme in the college. Some of the measures taken are:

- 1. Autonomy to project investigators.
- 2. Maintain good environment for research activities.
- 3. Room renovation and provision of equipments and infrastructure for conducting research.
- 4. The college campus is accessible for research coordinators 24x7.
- 5. Ensuring timely procurement of research instruments, recruitment of research scholars (JRF), timely release of funds etc.
- 6. Sound financial system providing a well-oiled mechanism for research projects.
- 7. Creation of separate Research Instrumentation Centre.
- 8. Regular internet connection and IT infrastructure.
- 9. Power backups from 100KVA Generator.
- 10. Providing necessary transportation when required.

The college has a well developed regulation to ensure the smooth functioning of the Major Projects, given as under:

PACHHUNGA UNIVERSITY COLLEGE PROJECT GUIDELINES 2012

- 1. All Major Projects and other projects should follow the rules and regulation laid down by the college.
- 2. Purchase of equipments should be done through the following method:
 - a. Project Coordinator/Investigator should approach the Head of Department to which he belongs to convene departmental purchase committee for the procurement of equipments.
 - b. Department purchase committee consists of faculty members in the department.
 - c. Final approval should be obtained from the Principal through the Head of Department.
 - d. Purchase should be done through sealed quotation as per college norms.
 - e. List of equipment to be purchased should be submitted to the Principal. Quotations should be invited in the name of the Principal.

- 3. List of equipment procured under Major or Minor projects should be registered in the department and will be looked after by the respective Heads of Department.
- 4. Cash book should be maintained by each project coordinator/principal investigator.
- 5. Half-Yearly reports including progress report, expenditure statement and future plan should be presented before the Principal, Head of Department and invited experts.
- 6. Duration of presentation will be notified by the Assistant Coordinator, IQAC cell in consultation with the PI/Coordinator.
- 7. Projects sanctioned under any investigating agency should be done efficiently and must be documented for future references.
- 8. All equipment procured under any project as per standing guidelines of the college, is the property of the college. Each department will be responsible for its maintenance and repair.
- 9. Any grievances related to project matter can be submitted to the Principal. The matter will be handled internally by the college's Grievances Cell and Project and IT Committee.
- 10. The Principal is the executive authority in any process of decision making

3.1.4: What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

The institution promotes a scientific temper/research culture among students by:

- Studentship Training: The college conducts and hosts DBT Sponsored Studentship training for post graduate students. This training-ship is hosted by the Department of Zoology, Institutional Biotechnology Hub. The main aim of the training is to prepare students for future research and jobs.
- Student training on Modern Biotechnology: The Department of Zoology hosted
 this programme under the Institutional Biotechnology Hub and DBT Star College
 Scheme. Hands-on-training is conducted for one week on DNA extraction and
 amplification to prepare students for their further studies. This is conducted every
 year from 2012.
- **Student projects:** Student research projects are conducted in some arts departments and departments covered by DBT STAR College Scheme. Some of the projects are published in journals and presented in seminars. Departments conducting student projects are:

3.1.8 Institutional Effort in Attracting Researchers to the Campus:

To promote research, the college makes efforts to be one of the research centers in Mizoram. The following activities reflect the system of attracting scholars to the College.

- Faculty members are given freedom in their personal research activities. The institute allows researchers to work under the supervision of the faculty members.
- 2. The college provides room for research activities.
- 3. The college invites research scholars to train under Institutional Biotechnology
- 4. The Institutional Biotechnology Hub invites students who passed their Master Degree to train and work on their area of research interest for six months, sponsored by the State Biotechnology Hub, Mizoram University. Students are given a stipend of Rs. 5000 per month.
- 5. The college also invites research scholars to apply for available projects and work under the college.
- 6. The college is the only college in Mizoram to host DST sponsored Women Scientist.
- 7. Invitation of Scientist and Professors for delivering lectures and speeches.

3.1.9 What percentage of the faculty has utilized Sabbatical Leave for research activities? How has the provision contributed to improve the quality of research and imbibe research culture on the campus?

No faculty members have applied for sabbatical leave so far. However, some faculty members have availed the following leave for pursuing research work.

- 1. Study leave for PhD Course Work.
- 2. Study leave for PhD Studies
- 3. Leave for DBT International and National Associate ship
- 4. Leave for International overseas fellowship.

3.1.10 Provide details of the initiatives taken up by the institution in creating awareness/advocating/transfer of relative findings of research of the institution and elsewhere to students and community (lab to land)

- 1. The college organizes international, national, regional and state level seminars, workshops, etc. on relevant thrust areas for researchers to share their research findings with academic peers, experts, research scholars and students.
- 2. The faculty members present their findings in international, national and regional level seminars.
- 3. The college adopted Phulpui village to help the community.
- 4. Students visit research institutions, universities and industries within and outside the state to learn about and become aware of the activities within other institutes.
- 5. Faculty members publish research papers and books.
- The college organizes exposure programmes for secondary school students.
- 7. The college organizes advocacy programmes for local NGO's.
- 8. The college publishes new findings in local daily newspapers. Eg.: New species discovered within the area.

3.2. RESOURCE MOBILIZATION FOR RESEARCH

3.2.1 What percentage of the total budget is earmarked for research? Give details of major heads of expenditure, financial allocation and actual utilization.

The institution receives grants from various funding agencies for research activities. The institution has an internal funding system for research and development schemes:

- 1. **UGC:** The college, during the period of assessment, undertook 23 UGC sponsored research projects out of which 21 are minor research projects and 2 are major research projects.
- 2. **DBT:** The college has two major research projects under the Department of Biotechnology, Government of India.
- 3. **DST:** The college has four major research projects under the Department of Science and Technology, Government of India.
- 4. **DST (Women Scientist)**: The college hosts two women scientists funded by the Department of Science and Technology, Government of India. In fact, these are the only two women scientists working at the institutional level within Mizoram.
- 5. **DBT STAR College Scheme**: The college is the only Star College within Mizoram under the Department of Biotechnology, Government of India. The college has received a total of Rs. 36.17 lakhs (Non-recurring 20 lakhs & Recurring Rs. 16.17 lakhs). Star college scheme supports Botany, Chemistry, Physics & Zoology Departments.
- 6. **Institutional Biotechnology Hub**: The college is also supported by the Department of Biotechnology under the Institutional Biotechnology Hub for North East Scheme. This hub has been hosted by the Department of Zoology since 2012. A total of Rs. 42.62 lakhs has been sanctioned to the college.

- 7. **State Government**: The College also hosts a project "Zo Huan" sponsored by the Department of Horticulture and "Icthyofauna of Dampa Tiger Reserve" sponsored by the Environment and Forest Department, Government of Mizoram.
- 8. **Private Sponsorship**: The college hosts a minor project sponsored by Zoram Educational Trust (ZET).
- 9. **College sponsored:** The college sponsored a minor research project for the Department of Botany to study the flora of the campus.

3.2.2 Is there a provision in the institution to provide seed money to the faculty for research? If so, specify the amount disbursed and the percentage of the faculty that has availed the facility in the last four years?

The College has an internal research funding system. There are three minor research projects sanctioned during the assessment period:

- Diversity of Freshwater Fishes in the rivers of Mizoram
 Rs. 50,000 was sanctioned in December 2010 and the research was completed in December 2011. The faculty members of the department of Zoology were involved in this project leading to the discovery of new species of fish in Mizoram.
- 2. **Cryptogamic Diversity of Pachhunga University College Campus:** Rs. 50,000 was sanctioned in 2014 and the project completed in 2015. The faculty members of the Department of Botany were involved in the project which was published in book form.
- 3. **DNA barcoding of Amphibians and Reptiles (Sauria and Serpentes) of Aizawl District, Mizoram**: Rs. 50,000 was sanctioned in December 2015 under the Institutional Biotechnology Hub. The project is ongoing.

3.2.3 What are the financial provisions made available to support student research projects by students?

Students' research projects fund available within the institution:

- a. **Curriculum based:** Curriculum based projects are available in the departments of Education, Public Administration, Geography, Psychology, Geology, and Environmental Science.
- b. Special course based: Special courses like the UGC sponsored Certificate Course in Pisciculture and Certificate Course in Human Rights have a funding mechanism for students project.

- c. **STAR College Scheme:** Student projects are done in DBT STAR College supported departments like Botany, Zoology, Chemistry and Physics.
- d. **Institutional Biotechnology Hub:** The college's Institutional Biotechnology Hub has a students' project scheme for UG and PG students. The Institutional Biotechnology Hub, in collaboration with State Biotech Hub, Mizoram University conducted a "Student traineeship" programme for six months for which a stipend of Rs. 5000 p.m. was paid to the trainees. Five students availed traineeship under this scheme in the college.

3.2.5 How does the institution ensure optimal use of various equipment and research facilities of the institution by its staff and students?

The college procures equipment for departments mainly for classroom teaching. Sophisticated instruments and other equipments are purchased from funding agency through research projects and infrastructure creating projects. These equipments are accessible to all faculty members, research scholars and students. The college ensures:

- 1. Installation by qualified engineers before payment for the equipments supplied.
- 2. All Heads of Department are responsible for the safekeeping and maintenance of these equipments.
- 3. Project Committee organizes research monitoring and equipment verification, ensuring all equipments procured under projects are available and in working condition.
- Students, research scholars and faculty members are trained to use sophisticated instruments. Access to these instruments is limited prior to training.
- 5. The college Research and Instrumentation Centre is accessible 24x7 and connected with 20 KVA UPSs to ensure continuity of research without interruption.
- 6. The college also provides energy backup with a 100 KVA generator when required.

3.2.6 Has the institution received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facility? If 'ves' give details.

The college receives various funds for the development of research infrastructure. These are:

- 1. **STAR College Scheme**: The college has received a total of Rs. 36.17 Lakhs (non-recurring Rs. 20 lakhs & recurring Rs. 16.17 lakhs). Star College Scheme supports Botany, Chemistry, Physics & Zoology Departments. Rs. 2 lakhs is available for each department to procure necessary equipment and teaching aids. The following infrastructure has been procured under the fund:
- 2. **Institutional Biotechnology Hub**: The college is also supported by the Department of Biotechnology under Institutional Biotechnology Hub for North East Scheme. The IBT Hub is hosted by the Department of Zoology since 2012. A total of Rs.42.62 lakhs has been sanctioned to the college.
- 3. **State Government**: The College also hosts a project "Zo Huan" sponsored by the Department of Horticulture and "Icthyofauna of Dampa Tiger Reserve" sponsored by the Environment and Forest Department, Government of Mizoram.

3.2.7 Enumerate the support provided to the faculty in securing research funds from various funding agencies, industry and other organizations. Provide details of ongoing and completed projects and grants received during the last four years.

The college promotes research amongst faculty members. IQAC and Project Committee provide relevant information regarding project applications and has aided in online applications for research projects. The college also organizes research monitoring and sensitization programmes amongst the faculty members. The college authorities forward relevant documents and aid in the application of research funds. The research funds have increased during the assessment period. There are 10 minor projects and one major project during the first assessment cycle, amounting to Rs. 44,23,500. At present, the number of research projects stands at 36 (12 major and 16 minor projects) amounting to Rs. 2,83,81,370 which is a significant progress. The college also hosts in-house Biotechnology Hub providing training to faculty members for their research activities.

 - Research studies or surveys benefiting the community or improving the services: Some significant contribution made by the faculty members and the research activities within the institute are:
 - The study of suicide and its prevention aims to prevent suicide by organizing talk show on public TV and newspapers.
 - The study of investment patterns within Aizawl city leads to the identification of the wrong investment done by investors in fraud and potential fraud companies. This leads to the awareness by the public in investments.
 - The study of border trade activities examines the potential of the border trade and the need of community awareness in such trades.
 - The study of medium-scale and small entrepreneurship educates the society about the potential of such businesses and the need for literate educated youth to make investments in this sector.
 - The college adopted Phulpui village. Apart from social work, an in-depth study and analysis of the village was done by each department and published in a book.
 - The study of fish diversity has led to the discovery of 18 new species of fish. This motivates the villagers to preserve their water bodies to prevent biodiversity loss.

- The study of landslides and their attributes provides a mitigation measure to the locality and State Disaster management for the future. It also provides immediate procedure to control such disasters.
- The study of mosquito diversity and their genetic composition (Bar-coding) leads to the correct identification and potential vectors of mosquito borne disease.
- The study of water quality leads to know-how about water quality and provides reliable data to the community.
- The study of medicinal plants and their uses leads to the conservation and know-how of plant uses.
- Research inputs contributing to new initiatives and social developments.

- The college maintains a cordial relationship with the Environment and Forest Department for the conservation of forest within the campus.
- The college established a relationship with "Hnam chhantu" a local small scale traditional dress and handicraft company. The college aids in their product popularization during the college's Cultural Day.
- The college also has linkage with Department of Horticulture in
 - Developing "Zo huan"
 - Conducting a Diploma Course in Mushroom Cultivation.

The college motto, 'Learning and Service' is acted upon by the college fraternity, and the society has benefitted in many ways.

- a) The college started a Village Adoption Project and Phulpui village was selected for this purpose. All the departments undertook a study relevant to their subjects, with an aim to open up developmental opportunities for the village. The study undertaken by these departments is published in a book form, which will be beneficial to the village as well as to the academic community. The college ensures the participation of the students in community work, practice teaching and environmental consciousness. The college also addresses the problems of the farmers in preserving the soil fertility. The farmers face a problem of land degradation due to the use of commercial fertilizers. This problem was addressed by teaching the farmers the process of mulching. The project is a self-financed project, and each faculty member contributed money for the purpose. The college also donated computers and other articles which are of great use to Phulpui village. The college also published a book called "An insight to Phulpui".
- b) NSS: The college under the initiative of the NSS organized a number of blood donation camps, and it even received awards for the highest number of blood donors in 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014 and 2015. The NSS is also involved in various community services listed under criteria 5.3.1 (b) vii.

- c) The college Red Ribbon Club initiates HIV Aids awareness through posters and campaigns.
- d) The college, through various seminars and workshops, tries to address social needs and issues. The seminars and workshops on relevant topics such as suicide prevention, sensitization of media personnel on suicide, Look East Policy, nuclear disarmament, cultural and historical heritage and human rights have been helpful in addressing the needs of the society.
- e) The faculty members affiliate themselves to and take the lead in various academic bodies as well as non-governmental organizations like the Mizo Academy of Letters, Mizo History Association, Mizoram Science Society, Geography Association of Mizoram, Young Mizo Association, INTACH Mizoram Chapter, etc. and make huge impacts on the society. They have also been put as editors in the journals run by these organizations.
- f) Goodwill services: A philanthropic service has been rendered by both the faculty members and the students. In December of every year, students and faculty members of the Department of Economics contribute and give away money to poor and needy families. In December 16, 2013 an amount of Rs. 5600 and goods worth thousands of rupees were given to a poor family at Phunchawng village as a Christmas gift. The Department of Education organized a Social Work cum Student-Teacher Interaction Programme at Durtlang North (ICFAI Road) on 28th June 2013. Cleanliness work was undertaken at ICFAI Road, near Public Cemetary of Durtlang North in the morning. The afternoon was devoted to a student-teacher interaction in the form of guidance and counseling. This department also organized cleanliness work at Bethani Children's Home at Sairang, Sihhmui on 1st February, 2014. They helped in cleaning the compound, the children were given a bath, and the park-benches inside the compound were painted. Such kinds of social works are carried out at the convenience of the departments.
- g) The college also organized Ecological Conservation awareness programmes with residents of neighboring localities in collaboration with the Department of Environment and Forest, GOM.
- h) The college organized an extension programme through the Institutional Biotechnology Hub. Rural colleges, senior higher secondary schools and high schools benefited from such programmes.

Students Participation: The college ensures the participation of students in these activities by taking compulsory attendance. The attendance taken during the CCA (Co curricular activities) is integrated into the students' academic attendance for their final semester marks calculation.

CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

Recognizing the importance of an excellent learning environment, Pachhunga University College aims to provide the best possible infrastructure and learning resources for higher quality education.

4.1 PHYSICAL FACILITIES

The college is situated a couple of kilometers away from the hub of Aizawl town in a sprawling campus of 760 acres. Its lush-green vegetation and wide-open spaces with luxuriant natural vegetation provides an excellent atmosphere for learning. The campus consists of several buildings for Administration, Boys Hostels, Girls Hostels, Academic Blocks for Arts, Commerce, Life Science, Physical Science, an Auditorium, a General Science Block, a library and several quarters for faculty and non-teaching staff. The campus also houses Laboratories, Seminar Halls, Zoological museum, Conference Hall, canteens, and rooms allocated specially for IRC, NSS, NCC, Health Clinic, Examination Cell, IQAC, Placement Cell, Students Union, students recreation hall and Evangelical Union. Infrastructure for sports such as a football ground, a volleyball court, a basketball court, gymnasium and a multipurpose sports complex are available within the campus.

4.1.1 What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

The college improves its infrastructure facilities whenever possible. Since the college is more than 50 years old, many of its buildings are fairly aged. The college, therefore, adopted the policy of enhancing, refurnishing and supplementing the existing infrastructures while constantly adding newer ones to facilitate effective teaching and learning. The newly constructed buildings includes a Library building, a Physical Science Block, two new Arts Blocks, Research and Instrumentation Centre, Hostel buildings for boys and girls. The construction of a multipurpose sports complex is still ongoing. The college also added a Language Lab, Computer Lab, Biotech Hub, GIS Lab in both Geology and Geography departments and an Internet Resource Centre. A CCTV is installed in college buildings and campus. The college has intercom (EPABAX) system. The college also has hybrid energy supply through 6 KVA UPS (2 Nos), 2 KVA UPS (2 Nos), 20 KVA UPS, 100 KVA diesel engine generator and 10 KVA solar panels.

4.1.2 Facilities Available For

a) Curricular and co-curricular activities – classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces, seminar halls, tutorial spaces, laboratories, botanical garden, Animal house, specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, learning and research etc.

Class rooms: There are 38 class rooms sufficient to conduct all the courses in one shift of the day.

Technology enabled learning spaces: All classrooms are equipped with LCD/LED projectors. Electronic interactive boards are also available. There are six free wi-fi zones within the campus especially for the students, and each faculty rooms are wi-fi enabled. Wired internet is available in all buildings within the campus.

Seminar halls: The college currently has two fully equipped seminar halls with a seating capacity of 100 and 150. One Conference Room and a Teachers' Common Room are also available.

Tutorial spaces: The college provides special tutorial space which are conducted in class rooms, seminar halls and laboratories.

Botanical Garden: The College is the only college in Mizoram to possess a botanical garden named *PUC Zo huan*. At present *PUC Zo huan* has 271 different species of plants and wild flowers many of which are indigenous to Mizoram and Northeast India.

The college also has a green house there are small flower gardens inside the campus in various places.

The 760 acres of land owned by the college is filled with trees; name plates are fixed on some of the trees displaying their common names and botanical names.

Herbarium: The College's herbarium at the department of Botany has a wide collection of plant specimens.

Specialized facilities and equipment for teaching: The college provides wi-fi for students and wired internet connections, classrooms and laboratories are equipped with interactive boards and LCD/LED projectors. The college also has a fully functional language lab.

Research space: The college has a fully equipped Research and Instrumentation Centre. The campus itself serves as a field for botanical, geological and geographical research activities.

Zoological Museum: The college have a zoological museum, the first of its kind in the State of Mizoram. This museum holds a collection of museum specimens required for classroom teaching and research activities. The museum also contains holo-type and new species described from Mizoram.

b) Extra –curricular activities – sports, outdoor and indoor games, gymnasium, auditorium, NSS, NCC, cultural activities, Public speaking, communication skills development, yoga, health and hygiene etc.

Separate rooms are allocated for NSS, NCC, Red Ribbon Club, Evangelical Union and Students' Union.

Sports:

Indoor Infrastructure:

- a) **The Auditorium** in the college with a single badminton court.
- b) A multipurpose sports complex is also under construction which will house two badminton courts and a facility for various indoor sports items such as table tennis.
- c) Gymnasium

Outdoor Infrastructure:

- a) **Playground**: The college has a fully fledged playground with pavilions which can host outdoor sports items such as football, cricket, hockey, football *etc.*. The pavilion have a seating capacity of more than 3000 persons.
- b) Volleyball court (Outdoor) and
- c) Basketball court (Outdoor)

Hall:

Many events are organized in the auditorium such as graduation dinner, cultural items, public speaking, special talks, skill development programs, seminars and conferences. There is also an open air stage/pavilion which can accommodate more than 1000 people.

4.1.3 How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? Give specific examples of the facilities developed/augmented and the amount spent during the last four years (Enclose the Master Plan of the Institution / campus and indicate the existing physical infrastructure and the future planned expansions if any).

The college ensures smooth transition from annual system to semester system. Some of the changes made during the assessment periods are:

- **a)** Renovation: Renovation and re arranging the classroom to meet the requirements of semester system. In semester system the college requires large rooms to accommodate more students.
- **b) Relocation of faculty room:** Faculty rooms are relocated next to the core classroom (5th and 6th semester). This re-arrangement enables good faculty-students interaction for consultation and counseling.


- **c)** Creation of platforms in classroom: Platform system are created in large classrooms to enable good academic transaction.

The institution facilitates the requirements of PWD students. Newly constructed buildings such as Academic Block for Arts, Physical Science Block and Library buildings are provided with ramps for physically challenged students. Special provisions are also made for physically challenged students in examination hall. Proposal for the implementation of ramp in all the buildings have been submitted to the State government.

- **Hostel Facility:** The college has a separate hostel for boys and girls. The two boys' hostels can accommodate 145 students and the two girls' hostels can accommodate 186 students.
- Recreational facilities, gymnasium, etc.: The college have the following recreation facilities:

 - Students outdoor shed
 - Auditorium
 - Students park
 - Students corners with benches
 - Gymnasium.
 - Rooms for student bodies.

- Facilities for medical emergencies: The college has a Health Clinic with a doctor and a nurse who sit on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. The clinic is equipped to meet the need of medical emergencies with first-aid kits.
- Library facility in the hostels: Both boys and girls hostels have separate library.
- Computer facility including access to internet in hostel: Yes
- Internet and Wi-Fi facility: Available
- Recreational facility-common room with audio-visual equipments: Students recreation hall in equipped with television.
- Constant supply of safe drinking water: Safe drinking water is provided through water cooler and filters in the staff rooms and academic blocks.
- **Security:** The College have a permanent security inspector. The campus is properly fenced, and security personnel are on duty 24x7. CCTV's are also installed to ensure security.
- Available residential facility for the staff and occupancy: The college has four quarters for teaching staff and another four for non-teaching staff. A new Principal's quarter is also to be constructed soon. A proposal for construction of staff quarter type C and D are now proposed to the Ministry of DoNER, Govt. of India

4.1.5 What are the provisions made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?

The college has a Health Clinic which is manned by regular doctor and two medical staff. Health clinic in opened twice a week, i.e. Tuesday and Friday. Common medicines are made available for staff and students free of cost. Off campus consultation can also be done at the university. The college has pool vehicle for medical emergencies. Apart from that, there are hospitals which are not very far from the college.

4.1.7 Give details of the Common Facilities available on the campus —spaces for special units like IQAC, Grievance Redressal unit, Women's Cell, Counselling and Career Guidance, Placement Unit, Health Centre, Canteen, recreational spaces for staff and students, safe drinking water facility, auditorium, etc.

The institution has provided ample space and facilities for the functioning of its various cells like IQAC, Career Guidance and Counseling Cell, Examination Cell, Placement Cell, Health Clinic, Students' Common Room, Students' Union Office, Evangelical Union Room, NSS and NCC (boys and girls).

A good number of water filter and cooler is available for students within the campus to ensure supply of safe drinking water. The college also provides filtered drinking water to all department staff rooms and the administration office.

The open air stage that can cater to more than 1000 people, and the two seminar halls fully equipped with PA system, mounted projector and chairs are available for common use. The multipurpose sports complex which is estimated to have a seating capacity of more than 1200 people is currently under construction.

The college hosts and conducts different placement and entrance exams such as Subsidiary Intelligence Bureau (SIB) exams, All India Pre-Medical/Pre-Dental Entrance Test, various exams under Mizoram Public Service Commission, recruitment of non-teaching staff under Mizoram University, CBSE-National Eligibility Test, and an entrance exam to the University of Hyderabad. The college also organizes Campus interviews.

Library staffs are also involved in voluntary frequent cleanup programme.

Each department in the college is equipped with a desktop computer, a laptop and internet connectivity. Faculty members and students can access the internet from anywhere within the campus. The departments are provided with a Wi-Fi connection; and there are five Wi-Fi hotspots within the campus with 100 mbps high speed internet leased line from NIC which facilitates internet access to the students within the campus. The Internet Resource Centre (IRC) of the college funded by the UGC housed twenty computers which are utilized by the students for procuring information, printing and downloading materials. All the students have access to the IRC in their free time. The IRC also conducts Orientation Course for students on how to use the computer and the internet.

4.3.3 What are the institutional plans and strategies for deploying and upgrading the IT infrastructure and associated facilities?

The future plans of the college regarding IT infrastructure are:

- Inter connectivity with Mizoram University Server has been initiated for E-Governance plan.
- Providing internet connectivity to boys and girls hostel has been initiated in collaboration with Reliance communications.
- o Providing databank of old question papers has been initiated and ongoing.
- Up gradation of Website and server to enable online admission system and online payment of admission fees.
- Imparting IT knowledge to students.
- Connectivity with State bioinformatics centre for data sharing and online journal subscription through DBT DeLCON network.
- o To make laptop/notebook/note pad available to all faculties.

Upgrading of IT infrastructure is carried out as and when required. Software and hardware are updated every now and then to keep up with the new technological advancement and plans are also made to replace and upgrade old and outdated machines with new ones. The IT and website committee plays an important role in the up gradation of the IT and web based facilities.

All classrooms are equipped with LCD/LED projectors to enhance teaching-learning process. In order to utilize the new technological advancements effectively to enhance teaching-learning experiences in the classroom, faculty members are encouraged to use PowerPoint presentation and videos. Senior faculty members are given Hands-on Training on how to make use of laptops and projectors. Students are also persuaded to make use of the ICT facilities to a large extent in presentation of their project works, assignments and class seminars.

4.3.6 Elaborate giving suitable examples on how the learning activities and technologies deployed (access to on-line teaching - learning resources, independent learning, ICT enabled classrooms/learning spaces etc.) by the institution place the student at the centre of teaching-learning process and render the role of a facilitator for the teacher.

All classrooms are equipped with LCD/LED projectors. Faculty members utilized the ICT facilities to the optimum in their classrooms thus enhancing the learning/teaching process. Tutorials, videos and online interactions are used both by the students and the teachers that makes the class more interactive and technology-oriented.

The college has upgraded computer laboratories with LAN and all departments are connected with LAN. Students and teachers have access to unlimited internet facilities and connectivity. The students' assignments are sometimes submitted through emails. Each department has their own department sites linked to the main college website where study materials and PowerPoint presentations prepared by the teachers are uploaded for easy reference for the students.

Teachers and students are given training on various courses such as DTP, internet courses and PowerPoint preparation at the Internet Resource Centre (IRC).

The college enjoys UGC INFLIBNET/NLIST facility thus availing access to e-books and e-journals which are accessed directly (Please refer to 4.2.4). The college also runs IGNOU course.

The college adopts a proper system to maintain and repair its infrastructure, facilities and equipments. The college buildings are repainted as and when required. Furniture including benches, chairs, lecterns and boards are repaired and replaced if and when necessary. It has adequate number of support staff to carry out various maintenance works including plumbing, electrical repairs, carpentry works, computer system, campus beautification, etc. In addition, the college also maintains and ensures the safety of the infrastructures and its forest reserve with the help of the security staff and forest guards. These maintenance staff performs their respective duties diligently.

Calibration of equipments by technical experts is carried out as and when necessary.

The Government of Mizoram provides the college with a dedicated electric line which prevents voltage fluctuation. The college also owns a diesel operated 100 KVA electricity generator and ensures an uninterrupted power supply in all computer laboratories through 6 KVA UPS (2 Nos), 2 KVA UPS (2 Nos), 20 KVA UPS, and 10 KVA solar panels. The college also has a steady water line to the college.

The college forest is the largest forest cover area within Aizawl City. The college emphasizes on the maintenance of a beautiful, eco-friendly, clean and green campus. It plants trees and flowers in and around the campus and paints the buildings neatly. The maintenance staff, faculties and students are actively involved in campus cleanup programmes.

The college has a vast vehicle parking place. Roads are maintained and various buildings are linked with good roads.

The college has a cordial working environment and a good cooperation among the faculty, students and non-teaching staff which helps them to effectively deliver their utmost service to the college and provide a good learning environment. The college maintains a cordial relationship with its neighboring local community leaders such as NGO's(YMA) and Local Councils for the maintenance of healthy academic atmosphere and conservation of the campus forest.

5.1.4 What are the specific support services/facilities available for

(1) Students from SC/ST, OBC and Economically Weaker Sections:

Most of the students in the college are ST community. The college informs and urges students to avail scholarships instituted by the government through announcements made in classes and notice boards. Support is provided by the administrative staff in processing of application forms and disbursement of the scholarship money when it is sanctioned. The government has now issued an order whereby all students are to have a bank account, and scholarships are to be disbursed by the government to these account only and not through the institution. The college also have "Sitaram Jindal Foundation merit scholarship" for Below poverty line (BPL) students. The college provides a mechanism where students can earn while learning called "Earn While Learn Scheme".

(2) Students with Physical Disabilities:

Differently-abled students are given special assistance during examinations. They are given special rooms and they are also allowed to have a writer. A class having a student with physical disability is allotted a class room on the ground floor and new buildings are also constructed with ramps.

(3) Overseas Students:

Students from overseas are made to feel at home and are extended assistance to help them adjust to the college environment.

(4) Students to Participate in Competitions:

Students are encouraged to participate in competitions and events at various levels and they have won prizes and awards. The college provides assistance in any way possible by assigning faculty to accompany students on events outside the campus and the state, by providing financial assistance, and by providing transportation if and when necessary. The college also recognizes the students with special accomplishments through donations and collections from faculty members. Such students are granted Duty Leave. Banners are also placed in the college campus to congratulate and recognize their achievements.

(5) Medical Assistance to Students:

The students can avail free medical service from the college health clinic.

It also organizes activities and awareness programmes such as Blood Donation Campaign, Eye Donation Campaign, Mental Health Awareness, Suicide Prevention programme and general health tips to promote good health among students and also to create awareness about health related issues. Blood donation camps have been regularly organized in the college.

(6) Organizing Coaching Classes for Competitive Exams:

Under the UGC sponsored Civil Service Coaching program, coaching classes were run for various competitive exams.

The college is also a centre for various entrance exams and has hosted several exams such as:

- All India Pre-Medical/Pre-Dental Entrance Exam in 2015
- State Bank of India recruitment exam in 2012
- Subsidiary Intelligence Bureau (SIB) recruitment exam in 2012, 2013, 2014 & 2015.
- Mizoram University LDC & Stenographer recruitment exam in 2013
- Staff Nurse Entrance Exam under MPSC during 2013-14.
- University of Hyderabad entrance exam from 2010 till date.
- The college is also a partner institute of IGNOU.
- UGC coaching class for competitive examinations.

(7) **Skill Development:**

(8) **Support for 'Slow Learners':**

The college conducted 'remedial classes' for slow learners. Each department also adopts a student mentoring system where each teacher is assigned wards. Counseling sessions are also occasionally organized in each department. Every department keeps records of students to track their progress. Many departments take extra classes to help students who are weaker in class.

(9) Exposures of Students to other Institutions of Higher Learning/Corporate/Business House:

- Students exposure are done via Institutional Biotechnology Hub and STAR college scheme.
- Students are also taken on field trips and study tours to give them firsthand knowledge and experience. (List of exposure programmes enclosed in criteria 2.3.8)
- The college has participated in students exchange program with Union Christian College (UCC), Meghalaya. Six students of Chemistry gave presentations at a Symposium under students exchange program organized by the Department of Chemistry, PUC and UCC, Meghalaya.

(10) **Publication of Student Magazines:**

Students have two publications where they can freely contribute their works – the college magazine entitled *Buannel* and their own newsletter *Campus Talk* (earlier it was *SU Voice*). The Students' Union newsletter is published where students actively contribute their own writings. Some departments have their own newsletter where students take initiatives forming their own editorial board. The Evangelical Union of the college also has its own newsletter. The Literature Club of the college has also published a book titled *Lairil* where articles were contributed by the teachers and students of the college.

5.1.5 Describe the efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skills, among the students and the impact of the efforts.

An entrepreneurship paper was introduced under the semester system at UG level in Commerce stream since the semester system was started in 2011. This paper consists of test per session with 25 marks, project work for 25 marks and semester end examination for 50 marks totaling 100 marks.

This course provides entrepreneurial exposure to the students and creates an environment for setting up and managing their own small units and is a basis for legal framework. At the same time, this course helps them to develop their skill to adopt in the world of business, trade and commerce.

The policy of the institution is holistic development of each and every student. For this purpose, the college organizes several extra co-curricular activities, and motivates them to participate in the same. Teachers are assigned a charge in all these cells and forums. Students are divided into four houses and competition are held amongst them to improve their participation in CCA.

(1) Additional academic support and flexibility in examination:

Extra classes are conducted for those students participating in extracurricular events to make up for their absence in regular classes. The college admits students in sports quota and awards marks for sports persons as per the rules of the University. The internal examination is scheduled to cause least inconvenience to the students who participate in extracurricular and co-curricular activities.

(2) Special dietary requirements, sports uniform and materials:

Students participating in sports activities are given a practice allowance to be used for their diet requirements. Students representing the college are provided with sportswear. The college provides all materials required for games and sports and hired special coaches for every discipline. The institution has an Auditorium and an open ground for indoor games as well as outdoor games.

(3) **Any Other:**

The institution provides financial and physical requirements of the students for extra-curricular and co-curricular activities. Inter-college, intra-college events and programs are organized by the institution. Student-oriented events such as Fresher's Social, NCC, NSS Camps, Study tours are annually conducted by the college. The college has instituted awards to recognize the achievements of outstanding students in sports and other co-curricular activities. The college selects a student as 'Best Sportsman/Sportswomen of the year' on the basis of their achievements in the sports activities. It also declares as 'Student of the Year' one student who is nominated on the basis of a consistently good academic record, co-curricular, extracurricular achievements and exceptional behavior.

Yes, the college has a Career Guidance and Counseling Cell. This cell organizes career awareness seminar, coaching class and other programs. Workshops are conducted on 'Facing Interviews' and 'Resume Writing' for the final year students.

- Conducted 3 months Call Centre Training program for hostellers during July-Sept 2012 which was jointly organized by the college and Shree Ram New Horizon India Ltd and funded by North Eastern Council (NEC). 30 students completed the course.
- Conducted UGC sponsored *Coaching Class for Civil Service* during September to November in all subjects. 30 students attended the course.
- Organized a Computer training course 'Course on Computer Concepts' for any 2nd and 3rd year students in collaboration with DOEACC Society. A total of 120 students registered for the course. The training was held during August to December.

The institution has a Placement Cell, which organizes programs to guide students in making appropriate career choices and gainful employment. A notice board solely for employment notice, called Placement Notice Board was made where employment notice of Government of Mizoram as well as other states are put up to create job awareness among the students. 'Employment News' is subscribed for the

college. A collaboration with Mathematics Society, Mizoram to train job-aspirants in Arithmetic, and NELIT Study Centre to offer computer training course for the students is under process.






PUC Students Tracking Overall




Arts Students Tracking







The college hosted Certificate 'B' and 'C' exams in the college conducted by the Group headquarters many times, and also conducted rank examinations. During the last five years, 97 cadets got 'B' certificate and 30 cadets got 'C' certificate.

- 26. As requested by the AVBD, Mizoram, the NSS Units or P.U.C. participated in the Mass Voluntary Blood Donation Camp at Civil Hospital doing some of the needful activities on that day. Besides, 5

- student volunteers also donated their precious Blood on voluntary basis on that day. One P.O. and 30 student volunteers attended the programme on 14th Febuary 2012.
- 27. The NSS Units of P.U.College organised cleanliness work to clean Public Urinals at the different places of Venghnuai, Aizawl on 24th March (Saturday). 40 Student volunteers and one P.O. participated in the programme. This programme is purely for the community of Venghnuai area of Aizawl city.

- 7. As per the request of the Green Mizoram Committee, Our college unit participates in the Green Mizoram day programme on 14 June 2012 at Secretariat Complex, Khatla. Two POs and 100 volunteers participated in the programme and planted 100 saplings in the secretariat complex area.
- 8. Clearing work under plantation site at Civil Secretariat Complex was organized on 28.7.2012. Thirty volunteers along with one PO were participated in the programme.
- 9. Cleanliness drive was organized for observation of Our College foundation day on 14 August 2012 to clean Block I and II buildings and their areas. The student volunteers of III Yrs BA and I Sem students of Geography, physics; History, Psychology, Education, Geology and Mizo Department along with 8 POs were participating in the programme.
- Clearing the surrounding areas of PU College football Playground was organized on 25.8. 2012. Two hundred volunteers along with 2 POs were participating in the programme.

The college faculties discover new species of fish and other organisms which were published in international journals. The college also pursues research in communicable disease (Malaria) and it is the first institution to diagnose the occurrence of *Japanese encephalitis* infection in Mizoram.

Leadership: The college is one of the few colleges in Mizoram having a UGC qualified permanent principal recruited as per UGC recruitment rules. The principal is the only principal in Mizoram colleges actively involved in research activities and completed major and minor research projects. The college is also the first college in Mizoram to have a full fledged professor.

Community service: The college offers various community services through NCC, NSS, Red Ribbon Club, etc. The college is the first and only educational institute in Mizoram that takes up village adoption program. This service to the community is in fact acknowledged by the Government of Mizoram.

Scholarship: Various scholarship schemes are available in the college. Government sponsored scholarships like Ishan Uday (UGC), BPL scholarship (UGC), tribal scholarship (Ministry of Tribal affairs), science merit scholarship (Govt. of Mizoram), Institute/private funded sponsorships including Sitaram Jindal foundation scholarship for rural meritorious students, Dr. H. Lallungmuana proficiency award for science student with highest mark in the university exam, Mr. H.K. Bawichhuaka proficiency award for arts student with highest mark in the university exam, Sunflower Electronics (SELZ) merit award, Zoram Educational Trust (ZET) award in Physics and departmental awards.

Post Graduate, Doctoral and Post Doctoral studies: The college has applied to the parent university. The college teachers association (PUCTA) along with the local leaders, the MLAs (Member of Legislative Assembly) again makes a representation in 2015, which is still under process. The college faculty serves as a joint/co-supervisor to students pursuing their doctoral studies in Mizoram University. Application for fulltime supervisor ship status is submitted to the parent university.

Infrastructure: The college is able to provide national level educational infrastructure to students. It is also the only college having both Boys and Girls hostel. The college campus is the largest campus amongst all colleges in Mizoram.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality, policy and plans?

The Principal is the head of the institution and he supervises all administrative and management works in the college. He is the chairman of most of the committees under the college. The principal is a co-opted member of the Academic Council and Executive Council of the university. He presents the college requirements in such committees. The principal is also a member of selection committee for recruitment of teaching and non-teaching staff in the college.

The principal efficiently plan and implement activities of the college through proper distribution of works amongst teaching and non teaching staff. The principal forms various committees for the management of the college. Teaching and non teaching staff are appointed as members in various committees based on their experience and knowhow. The delegation of powers through committees ensure the active participation of the staff in the college administration and it creates sense of ownership amongst all sections of employees.

Faculty involvement in the college management is mainly through their participation in various committees, as faculty in-charge in , students union, students houses, etc. The Principal looks after the functioning of these bodies.

 - The principal introduces tutor-ward system and incorporate Co-curricular Activities in the academic routine.
 - The principal organizes social and administrative guidance programme among non teaching staff in the college.
 - Career and counseling courses are conducted under principal's leadership.
 - Under the current principal, there is a significant improvement in the college academic results.
 - The principal delegates administration in the form of committees.
 - The principal advocates punctuality. He himself reaches the college on time.
 - The principal conducts interaction with students to get their feedback regarding teacher's performances and to know their problems.
 - The principal conducts regular faculty meetings, school-wise and departmental head meetings.
 - The college administration provides funds to teachers for purchasing books for academic and research purposes.

Faculty:

- All faculty members are appointed in at least one of the committees of the college.
- Faculty members are appointed as coordinators of various programmes under the leadership and guidance of principal, vice principal and senior faculties.
- Faculty members are given responsibility in organizing college function.
- Faculty members are appointed as in charge in students union.
- Faculty members are given freedom to organize special programme like special talks, invited lecture, training, etc., inside the campus.
- Faculty members are given provision to participate in leadership training, consultancy service, community service, etc.
- Guest faculty members are given roles in various college functions so as to integrate them into the college fraternity.

Students:

- The college has an active students union body. Each department of the student's union such as- Games and sports, Debating, Cultural, common rooms *etc*. has their teacher in charge to guide them in making decision and implementation of their programs and activities.
- Various clubs in the college functions under the leadership of one of the elected students union leaders.
- Each class has their own class representatives, who represent their respective class in the student's body meeting.
- Tutor ward system and counseling are organized.
- Students are given responsibility to organize various departmental activities including teacher's day function and felicitation function for outgoing students.
- The college involves students union leaders in organizing various college functions.
- Students union leaders in consultation with the principal and faculty i/c organizes college week every year.
- Students are given active role in various students' exposure programs such as study tour, institutional visits, etc.
- Students are divided into four houses. By making an award for best performing house, students are encouraged to participate in various college cocurricular activities.
- Students are encouraged to actively involved in NCC, NSS, Red Ribbon Club, Adventure Club, etc.

Administrative/Supporting Staff:

- The principal regularly organizes meeting with administrative staff to motivate them and also to create efficient administrative system.
- The leaders of Non Teaching Staff Association are involved in college decision making and are members in various committees.
- Spiritual and mental guidance are regularly organized with the help of professionals.

- The departments are given authority to organize training, special talks, invited lecture, seminars, tours, etc., in consultation with the principal.

- All internal marks, attendances and class performances marks of students are compiled by the department.



• Human Resource Management

The college has separate career guidance & counselling cell. With the initiatives of these cells, career guidance and counselling programme are organized regularly by inviting resource persons from state youth commission and other professional bodies. Through mentoring and tutor ward system, students in each department are divided into groups and these groups are assigned one faculty, who meets the students in his group regularly to address various issues and problems faced by the students. Faculty performance appraisal by students, staff welfare schemes and associations, viz., MTWC, PUCTA, NTSA, PUCMULCOS, etc., are also a part of HRM.

Industry Interaction

The college regularly hosts invited talks by inviting speakers from various professional fields. These professionals share their experiences and motivate students to become entrepreneurs. The college also organizes student visits to industries within and outside Mizoram as and when the opportunity arises. The college endeavours to generate more number of professionals by introducing certificate courses in pisciculture and mushroom culture (UGC sponsored).

Staff members are entrusted with different tasks in institutional processes including admissions, examinations, internal examination results, and cultural activities.

The above resolutions have been implemented successfully. The college has hosted several seminars, workshops and conferences at the state and national level. Cultural day is now organized once a year and it has been successful in inculcating the traditions and cultural values to the college fraternity and the Mizo community as a whole. Language laboratory and Research Instrumentation Centre are now utilized. The newly established Department of Biotechnology and Environmental Science has now serves as the feeder degree course for P.G. course in Mizoram University.

These complain boxes are regularly monitored.

Faculty members are also encouraged to participate in various UGC sponsored training and development courses, viz., orientation course, refresher course, short term course, etc.

Non Teaching Staff:

Non-teaching staff members are motivated to improve in their professional duties by creating a good working environment in the campus and also by organizing meetings with administrative head and the teaching staff association leaders. They are encouraged to attend training courses conducted by the university as well as the state government agencies.

The principal organizes 'Meet the Principal Programme' for each department in every semester. The principal inspires the faculty members to take up research project from UGC and other funding agencies. Academic achievements of the faculty members including Ph.D. degree, research projects, research paper publications, etc., are highlighted in staff meetings to encourage such activities.

IQAC submits its annual report to external agencies such as NAAC and Mizoram University. The internal quality assurance mechanism is updated to the requirement of the college and external regulatory authorities.

6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

- Faculty performance appraisal by students. Students evaluate their teachers at the end of each academic year through the IQAC initiated students' feedback form.
- Academic committee plans the college annual calendar and printed in the syllabus.
- Students counseling and CCA are introduced in the academic routine.
- Classrooms are equipped with visual and audio devices.
- Laboratory facilities are upgraded.
- IT infrastructures are maintained and upgraded.
- Preparation of teaching plan by faculties. Faculties are required to prepare their own teaching plan, which is reviewed and approved by HODs and Vice Principal.
- Submission of syllabus completion report.
- Submission of departmental annual report (DAR) and departmental monthly report (DMR).
- Visits of teaching classes by the Vice Principal.

6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

The activities and achievements of the college are conveyed in the internal quality assurance committee annual review meetings. The IQAC annual review meeting is also held with all the stakeholders of the committee. Policies and other necessary information are included in the college prospectus and also in the college website. Meetings of the Parent-Teacher Association, Alumni Association and Students Council are also utilized to communicate the policies of the college.

Other Relevant Information:

The college administration and IQAC plays an important role in the quality assurances system. The introduction of departmental IQAC coordinators, department monthly report and departmental annual report systems provides a good mechanism for record keeping and assessment of departmental performances.

CRITERION VII INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1 ENVIRONMENT CONSCIOUSNESS

Pachhunga University College is well known for its environmental concern. The college strives to create an eco-friendly green campus. About 65 per cent of the college campus is covered by trees. Equipments with five star ratings only are purchased; rain water harvesting system is also implemented. Environmental audit of the campus has also been conducted. Seminars, talks and awareness drives have been conducted to create environmental consciousness among students and society.

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

The Department of Botany has documented trees and plants on the campus. There are 300 tree species, 120 shrubs, 290 herbs and 50 climbers and twines some of which are lowering, fruit-bearing and medicinal nature.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus ecofriendly?

• On Energy Conservation:

- The college encourages the use of CFL bulbs.
- Purchase of electrical/electronic equipments with five star rating.
- Switching off ACs, lights, fans, computers, L.C.D.s when not required and not in use.

• On Renewable Energy:

- The college has a 10 KVA solar power system.
- The college have 20 KVA Online UPS

• On Water Harvesting:

- The college has a 2.4 lakhs litre water tank for rain water harvesting.
- Rain water harvesting system in many buildings.

• Carbon Neutrality and Plantation:

- Nurturing of greenery on the campus.
- The tree plantation program on campus has contributed towards pollution free air and reduction in environmental hazards.
- Students' involvement in environment clean-up.
- 'Litter free' drive is undertaken.
- Use of paper is reduced. Efforts are being made to make administration, the teaching-learning process, admissions, results, feedbacks and submissions of attendance online. Teachers submit soft copies of examination question papers. Students are encouraged to submit soft copies of their information and data.

• Hazardous Waste Management:

- The IBT Hub and Dept. of Biotechnology disposes off the microbial cultures and media only after auto cleaving them to ensure 100 percent safety. Replacement of Ethidium Bromide (EtBr) carcinogenic agent for DNA staining with cyber green DNA gel stain.

• E-Waste Management:

- The e-wastes are given for recycling through scrap material procurement agencies.

Wealth from Waste:

 News papers, waste papers, old paper wastes are recycled through scrap material procurement agencies.

• Plantation and conservation:

- Proper care of the gardens and plantations across the campus is taken.
- Plantation of ornamental and fruit bearing plants.
- Growing of medicinal plants.
- Plantation of trees by alumni.
- Conserving the available forest in collaboration with local community and State Government.

7.2 INNOVATIONS

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

The college has introduced various innovations that have shown a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

- Room rearrangement: Room re-arrangements are made to be more student centric. Departmental faculty rooms have been re-organized for better studentteacher interactions. Every department faculty rooms are placed adjacent to their Core students for easy access, better interaction, counseling and consultation.
- 2. **LCD Projector and laptops for innovative teaching methods**: Pachhunga University College has started using LCD projectors from the year 2007. Initially, seven laptops and LCD projector were procured from FIST fund sponsored by Department of Science and Technology (DST) Govt. of India. In 2011-12 session laptops and projectors were distributed to each departments with funds from University Grants Commission (UGC –NERO). Twenty classrooms, i.e. 100 % have ceiling mounted LCD projectors.
- 3. Internet for students: PUC has internal local area networks (LAN). The college has 100 MBPS internet connection through National Informatics Centre(NIC-NET) using fibre optics. The available internet protocol for the college is, however, limited to 100 PC i.e @ 1mbps/pc. The college has one Internet Resource Centre (IRC) funded by UGC and Department of Science and Technology, New Delhi. There are 20 PCs with internet connection and one printer available for students, accessible free of cost during working hours. The college also offers five free wireless internet hotspots at three selected places inside the campus. ICT based studies conducted, includes Certificate Course in Computer Applications and BPO training for hostel students, teaching internet browsing and PowerPoint presentation for assignment presentation.
- 4. **Training of faculty members on ICT**: The college conducts training on ICT enabled training for senior faculty members. Senior teachers are trained to handle modern teaching tools called "Modern Teaching Techniques". The course was coordinated by Dr. Lalramliana, Asst. Prof., Dept. of Zoology for a period of five months, i.e. from August to December 2012. One day training on web based technology was conducted for all departmental coordinators in 2012. Training of Departmental IQAC coordinators on web based learning and

- website maintenance are also conducted. Training on how to use projectors and PowerPoint are also conducted.
- 5. Web based learning: The college website was officially launched in 2008. All departments are assigned a separate e-mail and departmental website in 2012. The website has a fixed structure and function so that departments can customize their own website pages. Under these sites, many departments have uploaded their classroom materials and question banks so that students can access learning materials on their websites.
- 6. **Students' database**: The college has a separate students' database which can be accessed through local area network. The system is designed especially for the semester system students. This database is the first of its kind created among colleges within Mizoram.
- 7. **IT infrastructure Laboratory:** The college has four computer laboratory apart from Internet Resource Centre:
 - a) Computer Laboratory (Physical Science Building) : 20 PC
 - b) Language Laboratory (Academic block 4) : 32 PC
 - c) GIS laboratory (Geography Department) : 06 PC
 - d) GIS Laboratory (Geology Department) : 06 PC
- 8. **Wi-Fi Internet:** The College has Wi-Fi internet connection at every buildings and departments. There are five free Wi-Fi zones for students. Wi-Fi internet is also available for faculty and staff. It is the first college in Mizoram to offer free Wi-Fi to students which was started in 2008.
- 9. **Add-on courses:** The college conducts add-on courses for students such as:
 - a) UGC Sponsored Coaching for entry into civil services.
 - b) Certificate Course in Computer Application.
 - c) College Sponsored Finishing School for graduating students.
 - d) UGC Sponsored Certificate Course in Pisciculture.
 - e) UGC Sponsored Certificate Course in Human Rights.
 - f) College Sponsored Certificate Course in Humanities.
 - g) UGC Sponsored Community College in Mushroom Culture.
- 10. Village Adoption: The College adopts Phulpui village, 40-50 Kms from Aizawl. This provides good opportunity for faculty members and students to perform societal contribution. Students and faculty members' work together to disseminate knowledge and improve the livelihood of the local community. A book called "Phulpui" was published in December 2014.
- 11. **Teaching and Learning System:** The college is a student's centric college and adopts lecture method of teaching. Some innovations are:
 - a) Use of visual media and academic film shows.
 - b) Use of PowerPoint presentation in departmental seminars.
 - c) Invited lecture method.
 - d) On the spot lecture on some historical and political importance.
 - e) Witnessing State Legislative Assembly sessions.
- 12. **Student's-Faculty Assessment:** Student from each department assesses their faculty members in an 11 point assessment system conducted by IQAC. Each faculty is presented assessment results with their respective score mentioning their weakness and strength for improvement.
- 13. **Departmental Monthly Reports and Annual Reports:** Each department submits their monthly activities and annual reports in a pre-formatted system.

- 14. **Study Tours**: The college organizes study tour for students inside and outside the state. Some annual features are:
 - a) **General study tour**: Every year sixty students escorted by four faculty members in two batches are provided study tour outside the state mainly Delhi and Kolkata to visit historical places and academic institutes.
 - b) **Departmental tour:** Many departments visited good academic institutes outside the state. Joint seminars and student exchange programs are conducted by departments.
 - c) Departmental study tour inside state: This is an important feature of the college activity where students travel to important academic sites like historical places, national parks and sanctuaries where on the spot lectures are organized.
- 15. **Extension Programs**: Many departments in Science subjects organizes extension program in the form of institutional visit and special lectures to selected schools. The college also organizes extension activities to rural colleges.
- 16. **Research monitoring and sensitization:** The college project committee have organized research mentoring, monitoring and sensitization programme to monitor the progress report of ongoing projects, to provide mentoring through presentation by project supervisor who completed their research projects. Faculties with good potential for research are invited to attend this programme.
- 17. **Co curricular Activities**: The college is the first and the only college in Mizoram to introduce CCA class in the academic routine. Every Friday (2 Pm 4 Pm) is dedicated for such activities. Some common activities are:
 - a) **Moral based lecture-** This promotes respect for elders, faculty and senior citizens. Students are taught their role in society, family and institution. The main theme of these lectures is "*To become a better human*."
 - b) **Students Activities:** CCA program is utilized by students for various clubs and students activities such as: Student Union Programme, NCC, NSS, Red Ribbon Club, Chess Club, Literature Club, Evangelical Union, Cultural Club, Adventure Club, etc. to organize their own programs without disturbing the academic classes.
 - c) Counseling: Tutor-ward system is followed in the college. This CCA routine is utilized by faculty members to trace and counsel their wards in terms of their academic performances, daily activities, etc.
 - d) Cleanliness: Students clean their own classrooms and surroundings. The main aim of this program is to introduce the sense of ownership among the students.

2. GOAL – To fulfill the motto of Learning and Service the college give its best effort to be a student centric institution. Curricular transactions, academic programmes and co-curricular activities are planned to meet the requirement of the students. To build an atmosphere of trust and confidentiality between students and teachers. To allow students to share their personal problems regarding their studies, goals and aims. To provide support and guidance towards students. To ensure the academic improvement of the institution as a whole.

Aims and Objectives: -

- To plan curricular transaction and co curricular activities.
- To create infrastructure and facilities for students.
- To monitor the academic/classroom teaching activities of the faculties.
- To provide individual attention
- To improve academic achievements
- To help students realize their potential
- To listen to grievances and problems
- To build an atmosphere of trust
- To build students' confidence towards achieving their goals

3. THE CONTEXT

Students are the first priority in the college which is a student centric centre. Efforts are made by the college administration, faculty and staff to become more student centric.

Youths of today are facing a lot of problems in their personal and academic life. They are standing in a very critical juncture in their life; they find it difficult to make decisions which will benefit their future. Whatever situation they are in, they are in a cross road. The mentoring program addresses all these problems faced by the students, not only their academic problems but their personal problems too.

The role of a college is not only to provide education for students but also to create good academic atmosphere so as to provide great academicians and good citizens in the society. In order to do that the college considers that mentoring program is very important in an institution hence mentoring of the students is implemented in full force.

4. THE PRACTICE

STUDENT CENTRIC LEARNING

The college takes effort to become a student centric centre which is evident in the following procedure:

- The Administration plans the annual calendar and the activities to best suit the requirements of the students.
- Faculty creates lesson plans, work book and execute log book checked by the Principal and Vice Principal. The number of classes taken by each faculty is reflected upon in the Departmental Monthly Report (DMR). The DMR enables the administration to check upon the faculty's performances.
- Physical arrangements are made to be more student centric. Departmental faculty rooms have been re-organized for better student-teacher interactions.
- Internet Resource Centre- The college has a dedicated Internet Resource Centre with 18 internet-enabled PCs, and printing facility. Students can browse the internet, and work on their presentations and assignments. Students are allowed to print their documents free of cost. Free Wi-Fi facilities are made available to the students.
- Creation of computer laboratory, GIS laboratory and Language laboratory.
- The college has installed LCD/LED projector in all classrooms which allows the presentation of text, audio, graphics or video. This is more interesting for the students and improves the likelihood that they will comprehend the lessons.
- Study tours and exposure programmes are organized by the college. The college organizes 28 National/ Regional study tours and 27 study tours/field visit inside state.
- Micro projects are conducted by departments covered by the DBT-STAR College Scheme. These projects are not in the University curricula. These projects are published in journals and seminar proceedings.
- Student's awards are made available to encourage the students in their studies. Proficiency awards, merit awards, departmental awards, student of the year, best boy, best girls etc are awarded to encourage students.
- Students' participation in NSS, NCC, RRC, Adventure clubs, Cultural Clubs etc.

STUDENTS MENTORING

A program coordinator/head of the department makes allotment, allotting a certain number of students to a particular teacher. This forms a mentor - mentee group. Interactive and counseling sessions are fixed at a certain date and time. These interactive and counseling sessions lasts 30 to 45 minutes mostly. All mentors maintain personal files for all their mentees. Mentors are also provided with guidelines for the counseling session. This program is carried out department wise.

Counseling and Interactive Sessions are mostly held under these topics:

• <u>Career Guidance</u>: Students are given career guidance based on their respective chosen subjects. Many students are unaware of the prospects awaiting them from their chosen field of study. Hence, mentors are really instrumental in guiding them towards their future career.

- <u>Personality Development</u>: Students lacks qualities and confidence necessary to become successful in their future endeavor. Counseling based on personality development is really important in shaping them to be a better person.
- <u>Social Outreach</u>: Through the 'Each One Reach One' program, students are given counseling on the importance of reaching out. Every student is encouraged to help others and those in need of help. This is effective in developing them to be better citizens.
- <u>Academic Excellence</u>: Counseling sessions are often conducted to review the
 academic performance of the students of mentee. Weaker students are
 motivated and given specific instruction on how to develop their academic
 performances. Results of the mentee are reviewed by the mentor and any
 student's problems are addressed in these sessions.
- <u>Problem Solving</u>: Many students come to their mentors with many different problems concerning their academic life, their social life and sometimes their personal life. Mentors give counseling on how to fix these problems that the mentees are facing in various aspects of their lives.

5. EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS

- The college result has improved. The number of top ran holders, rank holders and pass percentage have tremendously increased.
- The colleges organize more exposure programmes and spend around INR 37 lakhs for students' exposure.
- Student progression is good.

- Students learn how to make responsible choices and decisions in their lives.
- Students are better equipped and prepared to face challenges in many aspects of life.

BEST PRACTICE – II

1. TITLE OF THE PRACTICE: RESEARCH AND CAPACITY BUILDING INITIATIVES

2. GOAL:

The college has built a foundation for research and capacity building within its own limit and capabilities. The aim of the practice is:

- To be a centre of research and as noted in the college vision and mission.
- To provide a good environment for research and consultancy.
- To provide good exposure to faculties in terms of knowledge and knowhow by organizing seminars and workshops.
- To allow faculties to go for higher studies. A good quality teacher leads to good quality education.
- To encourage and expose the students to higher level of studies for their future studies.

3. THE CONTEXT:

The college encourages research and academic developments and it promotes research activities in terms of doctoral studies and research projects. The college has 104 regular faculties out of which 60.57 % (63) are doctorate degree holders, 5 M. Phil and 34.61 % are P.G degree holders. Out of the PG degree holders 53.8 % currently pursue their doctoral studies.. The principal encourages every faculty to join doctoral studies. Currently there are 36 research projects (12 major and 24 minor) from various funding agencies. The challenges within the state are research initiatives at a college level and creating infrastructure for research activities. Quality maintenance of research equipments also provides a challenge due to remoteness of the state. The college also organizes 2 international and 24 national level seminars workshops etc. for students and faculty exposure. The main challenge in organizing such programmes is the travelling expenditure of the participants from other states due to remote location of the State.

4. THE PRACTICE

On research

- Research mentoring and sensitization programmes are organized.
- The Principal encourages faculties to pursue higher studies.
- Guest/Temporary faculties are engaged for faculties pursuing higher studies whenever necessary.
- Faculties are encouraged for faculty improvement programme in National/International institutes.
- Faculties are encouraged to apply for research projects
- Project committee is created to facilitate and monitor research programmes.
- IQAC also provides necessary information to faculties regarding research projects.
- Necessary infrastructure and laboratory renovations are done to aid research activities.

- Research instrumentations centre is created to aid research activities.
- The college provides 24x7 power supply for research activities.
- The college library subscribes journals and purchase books for research.
- Timely release of funds for research activities.
- Good water supply for research activities.
- The college applies funds from State government.

On Capacity building:

- All departments are group into two departments each to apply funds from funding agencies to organize National Level Seminars.
- All departments have organized at least one Seminar/Workshop during the assessment period.
- Faculties are encouraged to present papers in National and International conferences/seminars etc.
- Departments are encouraged to organize programmes inside the college to provide more exposure.
- Students are encouraged to participate in these programmes.
- Eminent persons are invited to deliver special lectures.
- Necessary infrastructure and equipments are provided to organize such programmes. To accommodate such programmes two seminar halls are created.

Constraints and limitations:

- Though the college has a Research and instrumentation centre the space is very limited to cope with the research activities of the college.
- The other limitation is the limitation by the university which does not allow direct supervision of PhD students.

4. EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS

a) Research Findings and Publications:

Faculties published their findings in National and International Journals. Major achievements of research activities are as follows - discovery of new species of animals, landslide and disaster management, antimicrobial screening, diagnoses of diseases, pest management etc.

b) Research Funding:

The college has 16 research projects in the first cycle of assessment with the total amount of Rs.28,07,750. The number of research projects has been increasing ever since, and in the 2nd cycle of assessment the college has 36 research projects amounting to Rs.2,83,81,370. The college also hosts two Women Scientist sponsored by DST. Table 1 shows the research funding from various agencies at PUC during 1st and 2nd Cycle of Assessments:

The college also promotes research by providing funds to faculty members with a maximum ceiling of Rs. 50,000 (Fifty thousand). Student project work has been started under Certificate Course in Pisciculture, DBT STAR College Scheme and through Institutional Biotechnology Hub.

- c) <u>Research Scholars</u>: The college also has 10 students under the joint Supervisor ship of faculties within the college. Recently two students under joint supervisor ship are awarded PhD degree.
- d) <u>Seminars and Workshops</u>: The college also organizes 2 international and 24 national level seminars workshops etc. for students and faculty exposure.

6. PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED AND RESOURCES REQUIRED:

- The main problem faced is that the University does not allow direct supervision of Ph.D students.
- There is no provision for PG studies in the college.
- Other limitation is the funding for the construction of Research Instrumentation Centre. The college constructed the centre with its internal fund.
- The remoteness of the location of the state sometimes hampers the availability of nationally renowned scholars and eminent scientist to participate as resource persons in the college organized programmes.

POST ACCREDITATION INITIATIVES

The accreditation by NAAC has helped the college in all round developments. The college took upon the challenge to become a better college by realigning the teaching learning process, strengthening and improving infrastructure, inculcating the research culture and enhancing social outreach. First cycle of accreditation was carried out in 30th August 2010. The peer team made recommendations for the quality enhancement of the college by indicating 12 different areas where it was desirable to enhance the quality or to maintain the existing standards and practices.

In addition to the peer team recommendations the college took several initiatives to enhance the quality of the college. A brief overview of the post-accreditation initiatives undertaken are as follows:

I. Initiatives in Realigning the Teaching-Learning process: The college made a significant contribution to the development of new curricula. Faculties of the college plays important role in the development of semester system adopted by Mizoram University in 2011. Being the only constituent college of Mizoram University, the college faculties structure syllabi of the Mizoram University being members of Boards of Studies and School board members in each department.

Room re-arrangements are made for a better student centric environment. Departmental faculty rooms have been re-organized for better student-teacher interactions. Every department faculty rooms are placed adjacent to their Core students for easy access, better interaction, counseling and consultation.

The college also introduces incorporation of Co-curricular activities class in the daily routine. This enables smooth academic transaction and allocation of separate time for counseling, students union activities and other co-curricular activities.

The college adopted a new admission regulation and new system of admission from 2011 to ensures better and transparent admission system. The college also enhance exposure programmes. Teaching has been augmented with field experience, industrial visits and visits to National Institutes. Being a remote state, students requires exposure to outside state. A total of 37 lakhs has been utilized to increase and strengthen students exposure programmes.

Curricula transaction has been revised and revamped in the following methods.

- The college's Academic Committee regularly held meeting at the beginning of each semester to look into the academic calendar and curriculum transaction.
- Faculty meeting on curriculum development.
- Allocation of courses for curriculum transaction at departmental level.
- Semester plans (work book) prepared by faculty.
- Semester plans cross checked by the Principal.
- Faculty class log book system in place.
- Faculty log book countersigned by Vice-Principal.
- Proper briefing of all students at departmental level with pre-prepared power-point presentation at the beginning of every academic year.

The college has also been awarded "STAR College Scheme" by Department of Biotechnology, Ministry of Science and Technology, Government of India. Four departments have been recognized under the scheme viz., Chemistry, Botany, Zoology and Physics.. The concept of Add On projects, Hands on training and students exchange, Students presentation have been very well propagated among the undergraduate students and teachers. The practicals focus mainly on skill development amongst students. Practical manuals have been published for student support.

The college received DBT Institutional Biotechnology HuB under which students, research scholars and faculties are trained to handle modern biotechnology tool. Outreach programmes for other colleges, HSS and High school students are also conducted.

Faculty training IT enables ICT enabled learning and teaching. Teachers have e-content in some subjects that are being uploaded in departmental websites for easy access. ICT based teaching and learning have been used. Students education in IT enables students PowerPoint presentation of their projects or assignments.

II. Enriching the Learning Resources

As per the peer team recommendation of imparting soft skill knowledge to students more computer laboratory are created. Language laboratory, Computer laboratory and GIS laboratory have been created during the assessment period. Students are trained to use basic of DTP and Internet communication technologies. Departmental websites are created which are linked to the college websites.

All classrooms are mounted with LCD and LED projector. In the previous assessment period there were 20 projectors (one in each department and one common) which has been increased to 38 numbers with one smart board. Peer team recommendation of Library automation has been completed with SOUL 2.0 software. Every department are connected through OPAC software for easy access. All user have been automated for easy transactions. Necessary software have been purchased for academic purpose. The college also use students database software developed by the Department of Mathematics for better student management system. Departments also create whatsapp group for easy information dissemination. The college internet have been strengthened with 100 mbps least line fiber optics connection through NIC. This enables ICT based learning and information acquisition through the internet. The College has Wi-Fi internet connection at every buildings and departments. There are six free Wi-Fi zones for students and one for research scholars. Wi-Fi internet is also available for faculty and staff.

III. Inculcating the Research culture

The peer team reclamation of allowing more teacher to acquire PhD degree have been done. The principal encourages faculty for higher studies and arrange guest faculty to take charge of faculty on PhD leave. In the previous assessment there were 33 faculties with Ph.D degree which is 39.28% of the total faculty. Currently there are 63 faculties with Ph.D degree

which is 60.57 % of the total faculty. There are 19 faculties pursuing their Ph.D degree. The college project committee organized research mentoring, monitoring and sensitization programme to monitor the progress report of ongoing projects, to provide mentoring through presentation by project supervisor who completed their research projects. Faculties with good potential for research are invited to attend this programme. The Principal encourages the faculties for further studies like PhD and research associateship. Two faculties Dr. KB Singh (Zoology) and Dr. KK Singh(Environmental Science) are awarded with International fellowship and two faculties Dr. Lalramliana (Zoology) and Dr. Rohmingmawii (History) are awarded with national associate ship. Faculties publish their findings in National and International Journals. Major achievements of research activities are as follows - discovery of new species of animals, landslide and disaster management, antimicrobial screening, diagnoses of diseases, pest management etc. One notable achievement of the college is the discovery of new species of fish and other animals. 17 new species of fish and 1 nematode have been described and published in reputed international journals and accepted worldwide.

The college has 16 research projects in the first cycle of assessment with the total amount of Rs.28,07,750. The number of research projects has been increasing ever since, and in the 2nd cycle of assessment the college has 36 research projects amounting to Rs.2,83,81,370. The college also hosts two Women Scientist sponsored by DST.

Laboratories have been renovated and Research Instrumentation Centre have been constructed to enhance the research activities. The result of creating these infrastructure leads to the attachment of two women scientist from DST. Regular PhD scholars has been working in the college which is not available during the last accreditation cycle. The faculties of the college also served as consultants in many fields like Infrastructure development at Stress management, Student Database of colleges, Establishment of Laboratory etc.

IV. Improving the Student Support Mechanisms

After the first cycle of NAAC, the student support system have been strengthened. The college conducts various certificate courses and personality development courses. Other courses like- self financed finishing school, UGC sponsored coaching class for entry into services, banking service training, Call centre & BPO training etc have been conducted.

New scholarship and departmental awards have been created to motivate students. Introduction of "Earn While Learn" scheme enables students with poor financial backgrounds to support themselves while studying. Private sponsorship of merit students are made available. Students exposure programes are greatly enhanced to improve students outlook and overall development.

More remedial classes are conducted to support slow learners. The introduction of Mentor-mentee system and departmental counseling enables better psycho social and academic support to students. The college conducts moral and career counseling through certified counselors and local church pastors. Departments regularly conduct counseling for students as part of the CCA programme.

Hands-on-training is conducted for one week on DNA extraction and amplification to prepare students for their further studies. This is conducted every year from 2012. Students Exchange programme are also organized by the college. Department of Chemistry Union Christian College, Shillong and Pachhunga University College jointly organized State level seminars in both the college. Students and faculties present their papers and organize discussion. This provide s good platform for upbringing scientific temperament amongst students.

V. Strengthening the Infrastructure

Taking into consideration the Peer team recommendation of renovating the infrastructure, the college makes its best effort in developing new infrastructure and renovates the old infrastructure. The college does its best to acquire funds from all possible sources. The major sources of funding includes Mizoram University, UGC, DBT, Ministry of DONER, Ministry of Tribal Affairs and Government of Mizoram. The college strengthen its infrastructure by creating new infrastructure and renovating old infrastructure.

The hub is the first institute in Mizoram to successfully diagnose the presence of the Japanese encephalitis virus in Mizoram in collaboration with the Aizawl Hospital. Other linkages includes:
- TT Royte agencies Northeast Consultancy Services in developing infrastructure at the college by constructing a women's hostel at the college.
- The college also has linkage with MULCO Ltd (Mizoram Multi-Commodity Producers Cooperative Union) in developing and catering healthy food at the campus.
- The college maintains a cordial relationship with the Environment and Forest Department for the conservation of forest within the campus.
- The college established a relationship with "Hnam chhantu" a local small scale traditional dress and handicraft company. The college aids in their product popularization during the college's Cultural Day.
- The college also has linkage with Department of Horticulture in
 - o Developing "Zo huan"
 - o Conducting a Diploma Course in Mushroom Cultivation.

VII. Enrichment through Seminars, workshops etc.

The NAAC peer team recommended organizing more seminars, workshops etc for faculty and student exposure. Accordingly the college have taken initiatives and organized quality programs. The college organized 2 international, 25 National and 7 State level seminars, workshops etc. The college also organizes 21 college level seminars and special talks.

Capacity building in terms of organizing seminars at the college level plays an important role in management, review and building leadership. IQAC organizes the following such seminars/workshop.

- 1. IQAC annual review seminar- organized on 3 occasion
- 2. Innovative methods of teaching in Higher Education
- 3. Orientation for newly recruited faculties.
- 4. Special lecture on PBAS system of Mizoram University.
- 5. Faculty training on website maintenance.
- 6. ICT enabled teaching and learning training for senior faculties.

Another unique feature of the college is in organizing Research mentoring and monitoring workshop. The college project committee organizes two workshop of such kind to enhance and monitoring the quality of research projects within the college.

VIII. Institutional Social Responsibility.

The college made a significant contribution towards societal developments. Faculties of the college participate in special talks organized by local cable operators and Doordarshan in sensitive topics like suicide prevention, forest conservation, disaster management, political analysis, literature analysis etc.

The college became the first institution to adopt a village in Mizoram. Phulpui Village was adopted from 2012 academic session. This village adoption programme is self financed through the contribution of the faculty. The college contributes academic knowhow, environmental consciousness, agriculture system, school education, science education etc. The college also organizes exposure programme for school students visiting the college campus, libraries and laboratories. Special case of admission are also given to students from the adopted village. The college published a book, "An insight to Phulpui". One very significant contribution is the discovery of new fish species from the village conserved river which was named *Schistura mizoramensis* (*Ichthyol. Explor. Freshwaters*, 25(3): 205-212.).

The students, staff and faculties made a significant contribution through NSS, Clubs etc. List of NSS activities signifies the societal contribution. The college receives award for highest number voluntary blood donated in a year in 2013,14,& 15. Students made a significant contribution to children homes donating their time and money.

The college also took a significant role in conserving the largest forest within Aizawl City knowing the importance of Community forest. The college organizes two Forest conservation awareness seminar with neighboring communities. The department of zoology also took initiatives in bird conservation by organizing awareness programmes with local bird watchers and nature lovers.

Institutional biotechnology hub made a significant contribution towards popularizing modern biology and biotechnology. The hub organizes training for faculties of other colleges, teachers of higher secondary school. The hub also organizes exposure programmes to rural colleges and school within their premises. This contribution is appreciated by the funding agency DBT by awarding an "Outstanding IBT hub" among IBT hub within North East Region.

IX. All round personality development through Sports and Cultural and students activities

Over the years, Pachhunga University College has won laurels in sports and cultural activities besides being in the forefront of academic achievements. The college has very good infrastructural facilities for sports and related extra-curricular activities, which have grown through the years. Students have participated in state level and inter-University level sports and won medals. New infrastructure created for students and communities includes Indoor Sports training Facility funded by UGC and Multipurpose sports complex auditorium funded by Ministry of Development of North East Region. The students' achievement in sports is listed in Criteria 5.3.2.

The college also organizes two cultural day events. This cultural day is organized in such a way to promote cultural harmony amongst the participants. Cultural dance within the North East region are performed by students within the institute, students from other institute and non- mizo children community within the state. All participants dress in their owm cultural dress and traditional mizo dish is served for lunch. This integrates the appreciation and tolerance of one own culture and other culture among the participants.

The college also forms new cultural clubs within the assessment period- Chhawkhlei and Ainawn Cultural clubs. These cultural clubs performed in various colleges, state and outside state functions. Various cultural item competitions are also held during college week programmes.

X. Administration and leadership

Growth in terms of academic and physical infrastructure requires good administrator. The Principal of the college actively and efficiently took the full responsibility for the upbringing of the current stature. The growth in recent years has led to more student population on the campus and more teachers. Some administrative and academic changes made by the current principal are:

- Organizing community feast for faculty and staff for better harmony among employees of the college.
- Organizing regular staff and faculty meetings for motivation and college administration.
- Maintaining financial transparency.
- Imparting leadership skills among faculty and students.
- The principal organizes departmental visits to inspire and acknowledge the contribution of faculties.
- The principal introduces tutor-ward system and incorporate Co-curricular Activities in the academic routine.
- Career and counseling courses are conducted under principal's leadership.
- Academic audit
- Introduction of Departmental book bank.
- The principal delegates administration in the form of committees.
- The principal advocates punctuality. He himself reaches the college on time.
- The principal conducts interaction with students to get their feedback regarding teacher's performances and to know their problems.
- Introducing faculty blazer which creates uniformity and integrity amongst faculty.

XI. Improving the Monitoring and Report Mechanisms.

Monitoring the academic activity and report system has been improved. IQAC departmental coordinators are appointed for better record keeping and monitoring system.

Some of the new system introduced for monitoring are:

- Departmental faculty lesson plan and submission to the principal.
- Departmental Academic audit by the principal at principal's chamber
- IQAC result analysis.
- Students faculty assessment system
- Classroom and faculty room visit by principal and vide principal.
- Academic audit in academic committee meeting.
- IQAC quality enhancement seminar.
- Departmental counseling.
- Submission of lesson plan to the principal.

Some of the new reporting systems introduced are:

- Departmental Monthly Report to IQAC and Principal
- Departmental Annual Repot (DAR) to IQAC.
- Seminar and workshop report to IQAC.

XII. Introduction of new courses

New courses and Post Graduate recommended by the Peer team have been proposed to Mizoram University authority to be introduced during 12th plan. However, the University could not approve the proposal. Two new departments have been introduced in the accreditation cycle- Department of Biotechnology and Department of Environmental Science.

Other courses newly introduced are:

- Certificate Course in Human Rights: This course is a UGC sponsored course and is conducted by the Department of Political Science. The course was sanctioned on 13th December 2012 and it started from 2013-14 academic sessions. Entry level for the course is Class XII.
- Certificate Course in Introduction to Humanities: The department of English organized a college-funded 3 months Certificate Course in Introduction to Humanities from 29th October to 15th December. The course was opened for 1st Semester students belonging to the school of humanities. This course had six courses contained in the syllabus namely English Literature, Visual Art: Painting, Language: Mizo, Musicology, World Religion and Philosophy.
- **Finishing School:** The college conducts a finishing school for final year students. This course is mainly for personality development. This is a self-financed course.
- **Diploma Course in Mushroom Cultivation**: This course under UGC Community College Scheme is to be conducted from 2015-16 Session. Entry level is class XII and the number of students per course is fixed at 50.





